DIGEST OF INTRODUCED BILL

Citations Affected: IC 10-11-2-31.5; IC 35-48-4.

Synopsis: Methamphetamine related conviction reporting. Requires courts to report methamphetamine related convictions to the state police department. Requires the state police department to report methamphetamine related convictions to the National Association of Drug Diversion Investigators so that stop sale alerts may be issued through the National Precursor Log Exchange to prevent individuals with methamphetamine related convictions from purchasing ephedrine or pseudoephedrine.

SENATE BILL No. 536

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning public safety.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:

1	SECTION 1. IC 10-11-2-31.5 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA
2	CODE AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS
3	[EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2015]: Sec. 31.5. (a) The superintendent
4	shall:
5	(1) receive reports from courts regarding methamphetamine
6	related convictions;
7	(2) notify the National Association of Drug Diversion
8	Investigators (NADDI) of each methamphetamine related
9	conviction and provide the following information:
10	(A) the convicted individual's full name;
11	(B) the convicted individual's date of birth;
12	(C) the convicted individual's driver's license number or
13	state personal identification number;
14	(D) a description of the methamphetamine related crime
15	for which the individual was convicted; and
16	(E) the date the individual was convicted of the



1	methamphetamine related crime;
2	(3) request that the National Association of Drug Diversion
3	Investigators (NADDI) generate a stop sale alert through the
4	National Precursor Log Exchange (NPLEx) for each
5	individual reported under subdivision (2); and
6	(4) notify the National Association of Drug Diversion
7	Investigators (NADDI):
8	(A) if the methamphetamine related conviction of an
9	individual reported under subdivision (2) has been:
10	(i) set aside;
11	(ii) reversed;
12	(iii) expunged; or
13	(iv) vacated; and
14	(B) if clause (A) applies, that a stop sale alert should not be
15	issued for the individual.
16	SECTION 2. IC 35-48-4-14.7, AS AMENDED BY P.L.193-2013,
17	SECTION 8, IS AMENDED TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE
18	JULY 1, 2015]: Sec. 14.7. (a) This section does not apply to the
19	following:
20	(1) Ephedrine or pseudoephedrine dispensed pursuant to a
21	prescription.
22	(2) The sale of a drug containing ephedrine or pseudoephedrine
23	to a licensed health care provider, pharmacist, retail distributor,
24	wholesaler, manufacturer, or an agent of any of these persons if
25	the sale occurs in the regular course of lawful business activities.
26	However, a retail distributor, wholesaler, or manufacturer is
27	required to report a suspicious order to the state police department
28	in accordance with subsection (g).
29	(3) The sale of a drug containing ephedrine or pseudoephedrine
30	by a person who does not sell exclusively to walk-in customers for
31	the personal use of the walk-in customers. However, if the person
32	described in this subdivision is a retail distributor, wholesaler, or
33	manufacturer, the person is required to report a suspicious order
34	to the state police department in accordance with subsection (g).
35	(b) The following definitions apply throughout this section:
36	(1) "Constant video monitoring" means the surveillance by an
37	automated camera that:
38	(A) records at least one (1) photograph or digital image every
39	ten (10) seconds;
40	(B) retains a photograph or digital image for at least
41	seventy-two (72) hours;
42	(C) has sufficient resolution and magnification to permit the



1	identification of a person in the area under surveillance; and
2	(D) stores a recorded photograph or digital image at a location
3	that is immediately accessible to a law enforcement officer.
4	(2) "Convenience package" means a package that contains a drug
5	having as an active ingredient not more than sixty (60) milligrams
6	of ephedrine or pseudoephedrine, or both.
7	(3) "Ephedrine" means pure or adulterated ephedrine.
8	(4) "Pharmacy or NPLEx retailer" means:
9	(A) a pharmacy, as defined in IC 25-26-13-2;
10	(B) a retailer containing a pharmacy, as defined in
11	IC 25-26-13-2; or
12	(C) a retailer that electronically submits the required
13	information to the National Precursor Log Exchange (NPLEx)
14	administered by the National Association of Drug Diversion
15	Investigators (NADDI).
16	(5) "Pseudoephedrine" means pure or adulterated
17	pseudoephedrine.
18	(6) "Retailer" means a grocery store, general merchandise store,
19	or other similar establishment. The term does not include a
20	pharmacy or NPLEx retailer.
21	(7) "Suspicious order" means a sale or transfer of a drug
22	containing ephedrine or pseudoephedrine if the sale or transfer:
23	(A) is a sale or transfer that the retail distributor, wholesaler,
24	or manufacturer is required to report to the United States Drug
25	Enforcement Administration;
26	(B) appears suspicious to the retail distributor, wholesaler, or
27	manufacturer in light of the recommendations contained in
28	Appendix A of the report to the United States attorney general
29	by the suspicious orders task force under the federal
30	Comprehensive Methamphetamine Control Act of 1996; or
31	(C) is for cash or a money order in a total amount of at least
32	two hundred dollars (\$200).
33	(8) "Unusual theft" means the theft or unexplained disappearance
34	from a particular pharmacy or NPLEx retailer of drugs containing
35	ten (10) grams or more of ephedrine, pseudoephedrine, or both in
36	a twenty-four (24) hour period.
37	(c) A drug containing ephedrine or pseudoephedrine may be sold
38	only by a pharmacy or NPLEx retailer. Except as provided in
39	subsection (f), a retailer may not sell a drug containing ephedrine or
40	pseudoephedrine.
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(d) A pharmacy or NPLEx retailer may sell a drug that contains the

active ingredient of ephedrine, pseudoephedrine, or both only if the



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1	pharmacy or NPLEx retailer complies with the following conditions:
2	(1) The pharmacy or NPLEx retailer does not sell the drug to a
3	person less than eighteen (18) years of age.
4	(2) The pharmacy or NPLEx retailer does not sell drugs
5	containing more than:
6	(A) three and six-tenths (3.6) grams of ephedrine or
7	pseudoephedrine, or both, to one (1) individual on one (1) day;
8	(B) seven and two-tenths (7.2) grams of ephedrine or
9	pseudoephedrine, or both, to one (1) individual in a thirty (30)
10	day period; or
11	(C) sixty-one and two-tenths (61.2) grams of ephedrine or
12	pseudoephedrine, or both, to one (1) individual in a three
13	hundred sixty-five (365) day period.
14	(3) The pharmacy or NPLEx retailer requires:
15	(A) the purchaser to produce a valid government issued photo
16	identification card showing the date of birth of the person;
17	(B) the purchaser to sign a written or electronic log attesting
18	to the validity of the information; and
19	(C) the clerk who is conducting the transaction to initial or
20	electronically record the clerk's identification on the log.
21	Records from the completion of a log must be retained for at least
22	two (2) years. A law enforcement officer has the right to inspect
23	* * *
24	and copy a log or the records from the completion of a log in
25	accordance with state and federal law. A pharmacy or NPLEx
	retailer may not sell or release a log or the records from the
26	completion of a log for a commercial purpose. The Indiana
27	criminal justice institute may obtain information concerning a log
28	or the records from the completion of a log from a law
29	enforcement officer if the information may not be used to identify
30	a specific individual and is used only for statistical purposes. A
31	pharmacy or NPLEx retailer that in good faith releases
32	information maintained under this subsection is immune from
33	civil liability unless the release constitutes gross negligence or
34	intentional, wanton, or willful misconduct.
35	(4) The pharmacy or NPLEx retailer maintains a record of
36	information for each sale of a nonprescription product containing
37	pseudoephedrine or ephedrine. Required information includes:
38	(A) the name and address of each purchaser;
39	(B) the type of identification presented;
40	(C) the governmental entity that issued the identification;
41	(D) the identification number; and
42	(E) the ephedrine or pseudoephedrine product purchased,
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1	including the number of grams the product contains and the
2	date and time of the transaction.
3	(5) Beginning January 1, 2012, a pharmacy or NPLEx retailer
4	shall, except as provided in subdivision (6), before completing a
5	sale of an over-the-counter product containing pseudoephedrine
6	or ephedrine, electronically submit the required information to the
7	National Precursor Log Exchange (NPLEx) administered by the
8	National Association of Drug Diversion Investigators (NADDI),
9	if the NPLEx system is available to pharmacies or NPLEx
10	retailers in the state without a charge for accessing the system.
11	The pharmacy or NPLEx retailer may not complete the sale if the
12	system generates a stop sale alert, including a stop sale alert for
13	a person convicted of a methamphetamine related crime
14	reported to NADDI under IC 10-11-2-31.5.
15	(6) If a pharmacy or NPLEx retailer selling an over-the-counter
16	product containing ephedrine or pseudoephedrine experiences
17	mechanical or electronic failure of the electronic sales tracking
18	system and is unable to comply with the electronic sales tracking
19	requirement, the pharmacy or NPLEx retailer shall maintain a
20	written log or an alternative electronic recordkeeping mechanism
21	until the pharmacy or NPLEx retailer is able to comply with the
22	electronic sales tracking requirement.
23	(7) The pharmacy or NPLEx retailer stores the drug behind a
24	counter in an area inaccessible to a customer or in a locked
25	display case that makes the drug unavailable to a customer
26	without the assistance of an employee.
27	(e) A person may not purchase drugs containing more than:
28	(1) three and six-tenths (3.6) grams of ephedrine or
29	pseudoephedrine, or both, on one (1) day;
30	(2) seven and two-tenths (7.2) grams of ephedrine or
31	pseudoephedrine, or both, in a thirty (30) day period; or
32	(3) sixty-one and two-tenths (61.2) grams of ephedrine or
33	pseudoephedrine, or both, in a three hundred sixty-five (365) day
34	period.
35	These limits apply to the total amount of base ephedrine and
36	pseudoephedrine contained in the products and not to the overall
37	weight of the products.
38	(f) This subsection only applies to convenience packages. A retailer
39	may sell convenience packages under this section without complying

with the conditions listed in subsection (d):

(1) after June 30, 2013; and

(2) before January 1, 2014.



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- A retailer may not sell drugs containing more than sixty (60) milligrams of ephedrine or pseudoephedrine, or both in any one (1) transaction. A retailer who sells convenience packages must secure the convenience packages behind the counter in an area inaccessible to a customer or in a locked display case that makes the drug unavailable to a customer without the assistance of an employee. A retailer may not sell a drug containing ephedrine or pseudoephedrine after December 31, 2013.
- (g) A retail distributor, wholesaler, or manufacturer shall report a suspicious order to the state police department in writing.
- (h) Not later than three (3) days after the discovery of an unusual theft at a particular retail store, the pharmacy or NPLEx retailer shall report the unusual theft to the state police department in writing. If three (3) unusual thefts occur in a thirty (30) day period at a particular pharmacy or NPLEx retailer, the pharmacy or NPLEx retailer shall, for at least one hundred eighty (180) days after the date of the last unusual theft, locate all drugs containing ephedrine or pseudoephedrine at that particular pharmacy or NPLEx retailer behind a counter in an area inaccessible to a customer or in a locked display case that makes the drug unavailable to customers without the assistance of an employee.
- (i) A unit (as defined in IC 36-1-2-23) may not adopt an ordinance after February 1, 2005, that is more stringent than this section.
- (j) A person who knowingly or intentionally violates this section commits a Class C misdemeanor. However, the offense is a Class A misdemeanor if the person has a prior unrelated conviction under this section.
- (k) A pharmacy or NPLEx retailer that uses the electronic sales tracking system in accordance with this section is immune from civil liability for any act or omission committed in carrying out the duties required by this section, unless the act or omission was due to negligence, recklessness, or deliberate or wanton misconduct. A pharmacy or NPLEx retailer is immune from liability to a third party unless the pharmacy or NPLEx retailer has violated a provision of this section and the third party brings an action based on the pharmacy's or NPLEx retailer's violation of this section.
 - (l) The following requirements apply to the NPLEx:
 - (1) Information contained in the NPLEx may be shared only with law enforcement officials.
 - (2) A law enforcement official may access Indiana transaction information maintained in the NPLEx for investigative purposes.
 - (3) NADDI may not modify sales transaction data that is shared with law enforcement officials.



1	(4) At least one (1) time per week, NADDI shall forward Indiana
2	data contained in the NPLEx, including data concerning a
3	transaction that could not be completed due to the issuance of a
4	stop sale alert, to the state police department.
5	SECTION 3. IC 35-48-4-18 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE
6	AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY
7	1, 2015]: Sec. 18. For any conviction in which the sale, possession,
8	or manufacturing of methamphetamine is an element of the crime,
9	the court shall report the conviction to the state police department
10	for purposes of IC 10-11-2-31.5. The report must contain at least
11	the following information:
12	(1) The convicted individual's full name.
13	(2) The convicted individual's date of birth.
14	(3) The convicted individual's driver's license number or state
15	personal identification number.
16	(4) A description of the methamphetamine related crime for
17	which the individual was convicted.
18	(5) The date the individual was convicted of the
19	methamphetamine related crime.
