SUMMARY—Revises provisions relating to the payment of wages to certain employees. (BDR 53-629)

EXPLANATION - Matter in bolded italics is new; matter between brackets [omitted material] is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to wages; authorizing an employer and employee to enter into a written agreement to exclude from the employee's wages a regularly scheduled sleeping period under certain circumstances; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel's Digest:

Existing law requires an employer to pay an employee wages for each hour the employee works. (NRS 608.016) Existing federal regulations allow employees who work shifts of 24 hours or more to agree to not be paid for a sleeping period not to exceed 8 hours under certain circumstances. (29 C.F.R. § 785.22) This bill provides that an employee who works for 24 hours or more may agree to not be paid for a sleeping period not to exceed 8 hours if: (1) adequate sleeping facilities are provided by the employer; and (2) the employee can normally enjoy 8 hours of uninterrupted sleep while on duty.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Chapter 608 of NRS is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to read as follows:

1. If an employee is required to be on duty for 24 hours or more, the employer and employee may agree in writing to exclude

from the employee's wages a regularly scheduled sleeping period not to exceed 8 hours if:

- (a) Adequate sleeping facilities are furnished by the employer; and
- (b) The employee can normally enjoy 8 hours of uninterrupted sleep while on duty.
- 2. If the sleeping period is interrupted by any call for service by the employer, the interruption must be counted as hours worked. If the sleeping period is interrupted to such an extent that the sleeping period is less than 5 hours, the employee must be paid for the entire sleeping period.
- 3. As used in this section, "on duty" means any period during which an employee is working or is required to remain on the premises of the employer.
- Sec. 2. NRS 608.016 is hereby amended to read as follows: 608.016 [An] Except as otherwise provided in section 1 of this act, an employer shall pay to the employee wages for each hour the employee works. An employer shall not require an employee to work without wages during a trial or break-in period.
 - **Sec. 3.** This act becomes effective on July 1, 2015.
