2 MAKING GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS AND AUTHORIZING EXPENDITURES;  
3 PROVIDING AN EXCEPTION TO LEGISLATIVE CONFIDENTIALITY.

4  
5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

6 SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE FISCAL YEAR 2023

7 APPROPRIATIONS.--Five hundred seventy-five thousand dollars  
8 (\$575,000) is appropriated from the general fund to the  
9 legislative council service for expenditure in fiscal years  
10 2023 and 2024 to contract for consulting and technical  
11 assistance to analyze key health cost drivers for the  
12 legislative health and human services committee. Any  
13 unexpended ~~or unencumbered~~ balance remaining at the end of  
14 fiscal year 2024 shall revert to the general fund.

15 SECTION 2. JUDICIAL FISCAL YEAR 2023 APPROPRIATIONS.--

16 The appropriations in this section are from the general fund  
17 for the following agencies for expenditure in fiscal years  
18 2023 and 2024 for the purposes specified and, unless  
19 otherwise indicated, the unexpended ~~or unencumbered~~ balance  
20 of an appropriation in this section at the end of fiscal year  
21 2024 shall revert to the general fund:

22 A. three hundred seventy-five thousand dollars  
23 (\$375,000) is appropriated to the court of appeals to improve  
24 and enhance the timely processing of judicial appeals and to  
25 increase efficiency;

1           B. one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000)  
2 is appropriated to the supreme court for the supreme court  
3 building commission to purchase and install security cameras  
4 and equipment in the supreme court building;

17 revenue and transfers to the general fund at the end of  
18 fiscal year 2023 are not sufficient to meet appropriations,  
19 the governor, with state board of finance approval, may  
20 transfer up to four hundred thirty million dollars  
21 (\$430,000,000) to the appropriation account of the general  
22 fund from the operating reserve.

23                   SECTION 12. TEMPORARY PROVISION.--Notwithstanding the  
24 provisions of Section 2-3-13 NMSA 1978 and Legislative Joint  
25 Rule 12-1, the legislative council service shall publish on

1 the legislative website a searchable list of the  
2 appropriations contained in this act as it passed the  
3 legislature, the name of each legislator who allocated a  
4 portion of the appropriation and the amount of the verified  
5 allocation. The list shall be published thirty days after  
6 adjournment of the first session of the fifty-sixth
