BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF OHIO:

Section 1. That sections 3313.60, 3313.603, 3314.03,	7
3326.11, and 3328.24 be amended and section 3313.6021 of the	8
Revised Code be enacted to read as follows:	9
Sec. 3313.60. Notwithstanding division (D) of section	10
3311.52 of the Revised Code, divisions (A) to (E) of this	11
section do not apply to any cooperative education school	12
district established pursuant to divisions (A) to (C) of section	13
3311.52 of the Revised Code.	14
(A) The board of education of each city, exempted village,	15
and local school district and the board of each cooperative	16
education school district established, pursuant to section	17
3311.521 of the Revised Code, shall prescribe a curriculum for	18

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all schools under its control. Except as provided in division	19
(E) of this section, in any such curriculum there shall be	20
included the study of the following subjects:	21
(1) The language arts, including reading, writing,	22
spelling, oral and written English, and literature;	23
(2) Geography, the history of the United States and of	24
Ohio, and national, state, and local government in the United	25
States, including a balanced presentation of the relevant	26
contributions to society of men and women of African, Mexican,	27
Puerto Rican, and American Indian descent as well as other	28
ethnic and racial groups in Ohio and the United States;	29
(3) Mathematics;	30
(4) Natural science, including instruction in the	31
conservation of natural resources;	32
(5) Health education, which shall include instruction in:	33
(a) The nutritive value of foods, including natural and	34
organically produced foods, the relation of nutrition to health,	35
and the use and effects of food additives;	36
(b) The harmful effects of and legal restrictions against	37
the use of drugs of abuse, alcoholic beverages, and tobacco;	38
(c) Venereal disease education, except that upon written	39
request of the student's parent or guardian, a student shall be	40
excused from taking instruction in venereal disease education;	41
(d) In grades kindergarten through six, instruction in	42
personal safety and assault prevention, except that upon written	43
request of the student's parent or guardian, a student shall be	44
excused from taking instruction in personal safety and assault	45
prevention;	46

(e) In grades seven through twelve, age-appropriate	47
instruction in dating violence prevention education, which shall	48
include instruction in recognizing dating violence warning signs	49
and characteristics of healthy relationships.	50
In order to assist school districts in developing a dating	51
violence prevention education curriculum, the department of	52
education shall provide on its web site links to free curricula	53
addressing dating violence prevention.	54
If the parent or legal guardian of a student less than	55
eighteen years of age submits to the principal of the student's	56
school a written request to examine the dating violence	57
prevention instruction materials used at that school, the	58
principal, within a reasonable period of time after the request	59
is made, shall allow the parent or guardian to examine those	60
materials at that school.	61
(f) Prescription opioid abuse prevention, with an emphasis	62
on the prescription drug epidemic and the connection between	63
prescription opioid abuse and addiction to other drugs, such as	64
heroin.	65
(6) Physical education;	66
(7) The fine arts, including music;	67
(8) First aid, including a training program in	68
cardiopulmonary resuscitation, which shall comply with section	69
3313.6021 of the Revised Code when offered in any of grades nine	70
through twelve, safety, and fire prevention, except that .	71
However, upon written request of the student's parent or	72
guardian, a student shall be excused from taking instruction in	73
cardiopulmonary resuscitation.	74

(B) Except as provided in division (E) of this section,

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every school or school district shall include in the
requirements for promotion from the eighth grade to the ninth
grade one year's course of study of American history. A board
may waive this requirement for academically accelerated students
who, in accordance with procedures adopted by the board, are
able to demonstrate mastery of essential concepts and skills of
the eighth grade American history course of study.

- (C) As specified in divisions (B)(6) and (C)(6) of section 83
 3313.603 of the Revised Code, except as provided in division (E) 84
 of this section, every high school shall include in the 85
 requirements for graduation from any curriculum one-half unit 86
 each of American history and government. 87
- (D) Except as provided in division (E) of this section, 88 basic instruction or demonstrated mastery in geography, United 89 States history, the government of the United States, the 90 government of the state of Ohio, local government in Ohio, the 91 Declaration of Independence, the United States Constitution, and 92 the Constitution of the state of Ohio shall be required before 93 pupils may participate in courses involving the study of social 94 problems, economics, foreign affairs, United Nations, world 9.5 government, socialism, and communism. 96
- (E) For each cooperative education school district 97 established pursuant to section 3311.521 of the Revised Code and 98 each city, exempted village, and local school district that has 99 territory within such a cooperative district, the curriculum 100 adopted pursuant to divisions (A) to (D) of this section shall 101 only include the study of the subjects that apply to the grades 102 operated by each such school district. The curriculums for such 103 schools, when combined, shall provide to each student of these 104 districts all of the subjects required under divisions (A) to 105

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(D) of this section.	106
(F) The board of education of any cooperative education	107
school district established pursuant to divisions (A) to (C) of	108
section 3311.52 of the Revised Code shall prescribe a curriculum	109
for the subject areas and grade levels offered in any school	110
under its control.	111
(G) Upon the request of any parent or legal guardian of a	112
student, the board of education of any school district shall	113
permit the parent or guardian to promptly examine, with respect	114
to the parent's or guardian's own child:	115
(1) Any survey or questionnaire, prior to its	116
administration to the child;	117
(2) Any textbook, workbook, software, video, or other	118
instructional materials being used by the district in connection	119
with the instruction of the child;	120
(3) Any completed and graded test taken or survey or	121
questionnaire filled out by the child;	122
(4) Copies of the statewide academic standards and each	123
model curriculum developed pursuant to section 3301.079 of the	124
Revised Code, which copies shall be available at all times	125
during school hours in each district school building.	126

(B) Beginning September 15, 2001, except as required in	136
division (C) of this section and division (C) of section	137
3313.614 of the Revised Code, the requirements for graduation	138
from every high school shall include twenty units earned in	139
grades nine through twelve and shall be distributed as follows:	140
(1) English language arts, four units;	141
(2) Health, one-half unit;	142
(3) Mathematics, three units;	143
(4) Physical education, one-half unit;	144
(5) Science, two units until September 15, 2003, and three	145
units thereafter, which at all times shall include both of the	146
following:	147
(a) Biological sciences, one unit;	148
(b) Physical sciences, one unit.	149
(6) History and government, one unit, which shall comply	150
with division (M) of this section and shall include both of the	151
following:	152
(a) American history, one-half unit;	153
(b) American government, one-half unit.	154
(7) Social studies, two units.	155
Beginning with students who enter ninth grade for the	156
first time on or after July 1, 2017, the two units of	157
instruction prescribed by division (B)(7) of this section shall	158
include at least one-half unit of instruction in the study of	159

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world history and civilizations.	160
(8) Elective units, seven units until September 15, 2003,	161
and six units thereafter.	162
Each student's electives shall include at least one unit,	163
or two half units, chosen from among the areas of	164
business/technology, fine arts, and/or foreign language.	165
(C) Beginning with students who enter ninth grade for the	166
first time on or after July 1, 2010, except as provided in	167
divisions (D) to (F) of this section, the requirements for	168
graduation from every public and chartered nonpublic high school	169
shall include twenty units that are designed to prepare students	170
for the workforce and college. The units shall be distributed as	171
follows:	172
(1) English language arts, four units;	173
(2) Health, one-half unit, which shall include instruction	174
both of the following:	175
(a) Instruction in nutrition and the benefits of	176
nutritious foods and physical activity for overall health;	177
(b) Beginning with students who enter the ninth grade for	178
the first time on or after July 1, 2016, training in	179
cardiopulmonary resuscitation and the use of an automated	180
external defibrillator as prescribed by section 3313.6021 of the	181
Revised Code. However, if a student is excused from instruction	182
in cardiopulmonary resuscitation under section 3313.60 of the	183
Revised Code, the student shall not be required to have such	184
training.	185
(3) Mathematics, four units, which shall include one unit	186
of algebra II or the equivalent of algebra II;	187

(4) Physical education, one-half unit;	188
(5) Science, three units with inquiry-based laboratory	189
experience that engages students in asking valid scientific	190
questions and gathering and analyzing information, which shall	191
include the following, or their equivalent:	192
(a) Physical sciences, one unit;	193
(b) Life sciences, one unit;	194
(c) Advanced study in one or more of the following sciences, one unit:	195 196
(i) Chemistry, physics, or other physical science;	197
(ii) Advanced biology or other life science;	198
(iii) Astronomy, physical geology, or other earth or space science.	199 200
(6) History and government, one unit, which shall comply	201
with division (M) of this section and shall include both of the	202
following:	203
(a) American history, one-half unit;	204
(b) American government, one-half unit.	205
(7) Social studies, two units.	206
Each school shall integrate the study of economics and	207
financial literacy, as expressed in the social studies academic	208
content standards adopted by the state board of education under	209
division (A)(1) of section 3301.079 of the Revised Code and the	210
academic content standards for financial literacy and	211
entrepreneurship adopted under division (A)(2) of that section,	212
into one or more existing social studies credits required under	213
division (C)(7) of this section, or into the content of another	214

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class, so that every high school student receives instruction in	215
those concepts. In developing the curriculum required by this	216
paragraph, schools shall use available public-private	217
partnerships and resources and materials that exist in business,	218
industry, and through the centers for economics education at	219
institutions of higher education in the state.	220

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Beginning with students who enter ninth grade for the first time on or after July 1, 2017, the two units of instruction prescribed by division (C)(7) of this section shall include at least one-half unit of instruction in the study of world history and civilizations.

226 (8) Five units consisting of one or any combination of foreign language, fine arts, business, career-technical 227 education, family and consumer sciences, technology, 228 agricultural education, a junior reserve officer training corps 229 (JROTC) program approved by the congress of the United States 230 under title 10 of the United States Code, or English language 231 arts, mathematics, science, or social studies courses not 232 otherwise required under division (C) of this section. 233

Ohioans must be prepared to apply increased knowledge and 234 skills in the workplace and to adapt their knowledge and skills 235 quickly to meet the rapidly changing conditions of the twenty-236 first century. National studies indicate that all high school 237 graduates need the same academic foundation, regardless of the 238 opportunities they pursue after graduation. The goal of Ohio's 239 system of elementary and secondary education is to prepare all 240 students for and seamlessly connect all students to success in 241 life beyond high school graduation, regardless of whether the 242 next step is entering the workforce, beginning an 243 apprenticeship, engaging in post-secondary training, serving in 244

the military, or pursuing a college degree.	245
The requirements for graduation prescribed in division (C)	246
of this section are the standard expectation for all students	247
entering ninth grade for the first time at a public or chartered	248
nonpublic high school on or after July 1, 2010. A student may	249
satisfy this expectation through a variety of methods,	250
including, but not limited to, integrated, applied, career-	251
technical, and traditional coursework.	252
Whereas teacher quality is essential for student success	253
when completing the requirements for graduation, the general	254
assembly shall appropriate funds for strategic initiatives	255
designed to strengthen schools' capacities to hire and retain	256
highly qualified teachers in the subject areas required by the	257
curriculum. Such initiatives are expected to require an	258
investment of \$120,000,000 over five years.	259
Stronger coordination between high schools and	260
institutions of higher education is necessary to prepare	261
students for more challenging academic endeavors and to lessen	262
the need for academic remediation in college, thereby reducing	263
the costs of higher education for Ohio's students, families, and	264
the state. The state board and the chancellor of the Ohio board	265
of regents shall develop policies to ensure that only in rare	266
instances will students who complete the requirements for	267
graduation prescribed in division (C) of this section require	268
academic remediation after high school.	269
School districts, community schools, and chartered	270
nonpublic schools shall integrate technology into learning	271
experiences across the curriculum in order to maximize	272
efficiency, enhance learning, and prepare students for success	273

in the technology-driven twenty-first century. Districts and

schools shall use distance and web-based course delivery as a	275
method of providing or augmenting all instruction required under	276
this division, including laboratory experience in science.	277
Districts and schools shall utilize technology access and	278
electronic learning opportunities provided by the broadcast	279
educational media commission, chancellor, the Ohio learning	280
network, education technology centers, public television	281
stations, and other public and private providers.	282
(D) Except as provided in division (E) of this section, a	283
student who enters ninth grade on or after July 1, 2010, and	284
before July 1, 2016, may qualify for graduation from a public or	285
chartered nonpublic high school even though the student has not	286
completed the requirements for graduation prescribed in division	287
(C) of this section if all of the following conditions are	288
satisfied:	289
(1) During the student's third year of attending high	290
school, as determined by the school, the student and the	291
student's parent, guardian, or custodian sign and file with the	292
school a written statement asserting the parent's, guardian's,	293
or custodian's consent to the student's graduating without	294
completing the requirements for graduation prescribed in	295
division (C) of this section and acknowledging that one	296
consequence of not completing those requirements is	297
ineligibility to enroll in most state universities in Ohio	298
without further coursework.	299
(2) The student and parent, guardian, or custodian fulfill	300
any procedural requirements the school stipulates to ensure the	301
student's and parent's, guardian's, or custodian's informed	302
consent and to facilitate orderly filing of statements under	303

division (D)(1) of this section. Annually, each district or

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school shall notify the department of education of the number of	305
students who choose to qualify for graduation under division (D)	306
of this section and the number of students who complete the	307
student's success plan and graduate from high school.	308
(3) The student and the student's parent, guardian, or	309
custodian and a representative of the student's high school	310
jointly develop a student success plan for the student in the	311
manner described in division (C)(1) of section 3313.6020 of the	312
Revised Code that specifies the student matriculating to a two-	313
year degree program, acquiring a business and industry-	314
recognized credential, or entering an apprenticeship.	315
(4) The student's high school provides counseling and	316
support for the student related to the plan developed under	317
division (D)(3) of this section during the remainder of the	318
student's high school experience.	319
(5)(a) Except as provided in division (D)(5)(b) of this	320
section, the student successfully completes, at a minimum, the	321
curriculum prescribed in division (B) of this section.	322
(b) Beginning with students who enter ninth grade for the	323
first time on or after July 1, 2014, a student shall be required	324
to complete successfully, at the minimum, the curriculum	325
prescribed in division (B) of this section, except as follows:	326
(i) Mathematics, four units, one unit which shall be one	327
of the following:	328
(I) Probability and statistics;	329
(II) Computer programming;	330
(III) Applied mathematics or quantitative reasoning;	331
(IV) Any other course approved by the department using	332

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standards established by the superintendent not later than	333
October 1, 2014.	334
(ii) Elective units, five units;	335
(iii) Science, three units as prescribed by division (B)	336
of this section which shall include inquiry-based laboratory	337
experience that engages students in asking valid scientific	338
questions and gathering and analyzing information.	339
The department, in collaboration with the chancellor,	340
shall analyze student performance data to determine if there are	341
mitigating factors that warrant extending the exception	342
permitted by division (D) of this section to high school classes	343
beyond those entering ninth grade before July 1, 2016. The	344
department shall submit its findings and any recommendations not	345
later than December 1, 2015, to the speaker and minority leader	346
of the house of representatives, the president and minority	347
leader of the senate, the chairpersons and ranking minority	348
members of the standing committees of the house of	349
representatives and the senate that consider education	350
legislation, the state board of education, and the	351
superintendent of public instruction.	352
(E) Each school district and chartered nonpublic school	353
retains the authority to require an even more challenging	354
minimum curriculum for high school graduation than specified in	355
division (B) or (C) of this section. A school district board of	356
education, through the adoption of a resolution, or the	357
governing authority of a chartered nonpublic school may	358
stipulate any of the following:	359
(1) A minimum high school curriculum that requires more	360
than twenty units of academic credit to graduate:	361

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(2) An exception to the district's or school's minimum	362
high school curriculum that is comparable to the exception	363
provided in division (D) of this section but with additional	364
requirements, which may include a requirement that the student	365
successfully complete more than the minimum curriculum	366
prescribed in division (B) of this section;	367
(3) That no exception comparable to that provided in	368
division (D) of this section is available.	369
(F) A student enrolled in a dropout prevention and	370
recovery program, which program has received a waiver from the	371
department, may qualify for graduation from high school by	372
successfully completing a competency-based instructional program	373
administered by the dropout prevention and recovery program in	374
lieu of completing the requirements for graduation prescribed in	375
division (C) of this section. The department shall grant a	376
waiver to a dropout prevention and recovery program, within	377
sixty days after the program applies for the waiver, if the	378
program meets all of the following conditions:	379
(1) The program serves only students not younger than	380
sixteen years of age and not older than twenty-one years of age.	381
(2) The program enrolls students who, at the time of their	382
initial enrollment, either, or both, are at least one grade	383
level behind their cohort age groups or experience crises that	384
significantly interfere with their academic progress such that	385
they are prevented from continuing their traditional programs.	386
(3) The program requires students to attain at least the	387
applicable score designated for each of the assessments	388
prescribed under division (B)(1) of section 3301.0710 of the	389

Revised Code or, to the extent prescribed by rule of the state

board under division (D)(5) of section 3301.0712 of the Revised	391
Code, division (B)(2) of that section.	392
(4) The program develops a student success plan for the	393
student in the manner described in division (C)(1) of section	394
3313.6020 of the Revised Code that specifies the student's	395
matriculating to a two-year degree program, acquiring a business	396
and industry-recognized credential, or entering an	397
apprenticeship.	398
(5) The program provides counseling and support for the	399
student related to the plan developed under division (F)(4) of	400
this section during the remainder of the student's high school	401
experience.	402
(6) The program requires the student and the student's	403
parent, guardian, or custodian to sign and file, in accordance	404
with procedural requirements stipulated by the program, a	405
written statement asserting the parent's, guardian's, or	406
custodian's consent to the student's graduating without	407
completing the requirements for graduation prescribed in	408
division (C) of this section and acknowledging that one	409
consequence of not completing those requirements is	410
ineligibility to enroll in most state universities in Ohio	411
without further coursework.	412
(7) Prior to receiving the waiver, the program has	413
submitted to the department an instructional plan that	414
demonstrates how the academic content standards adopted by the	415
state board under section 3301.079 of the Revised Code will be	416
taught and assessed.	417
(8) Prior to receiving the waiver, the program has	418
submitted to the department a policy on career advising that	419

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satisfies the requirements of section 3313.6020 of the Revised	420
Code, with an emphasis on how every student will receive career	421
advising.	422
(9) Prior to receiving the waiver, the program has	423
submitted to the department a written agreement outlining the	424
future cooperation between the program and any combination of	425
local job training, postsecondary education, nonprofit, and	426
health and social service organizations to provide services for	427
students in the program and their families.	428
Divisions (F)(8) and (9) of this section apply only to	429
waivers granted on or after July 1, 2015.	430
If the department does not act either to grant the waiver	431
or to reject the program application for the waiver within sixty	432
days as required under this section, the waiver shall be	433
considered to be granted.	434
(G) Every high school may permit students below the ninth	435
grade to take advanced work. If a high school so permits, it	436
shall award high school credit for successful completion of the	437
advanced work and shall count such advanced work toward the	438
graduation requirements of division (B) or (C) of this section	439
if the advanced work was both:	440
(1) Taught by a person who possesses a license or	441
certificate issued under section 3301.071, 3319.22, or 3319.222	442
of the Revised Code that is valid for teaching high school;	443
(2) Designated by the board of education of the city,	444
local, or exempted village school district, the board of the	445
cooperative education school district, or the governing	446
authority of the chartered nonpublic school as meeting the high	447
school curriculum requirements.	448

Each high school shall record on the student's high school	449
transcript all high school credit awarded under division (G) of	450
this section. In addition, if the student completed a seventh-	451
or eighth-grade fine arts course described in division (K) of	452
this section and the course qualified for high school credit	453
under that division, the high school shall record that course on	454
the student's high school transcript.	455
(H) The department shall make its individual academic	456
career plan available through its Ohio career information system	457
web site for districts and schools to use as a tool for	458
communicating with and providing guidance to students and	459
families in selecting high school courses.	460
(I) Units earned in English language arts, mathematics,	461
science, and social studies that are delivered through	462
integrated academic and career-technical instruction are	463
eligible to meet the graduation requirements of division (B) or	464
(C) of this section.	465
(J) The state board, in consultation with the chancellor,	466
shall adopt a statewide plan implementing methods for students	467
to earn units of high school credit based on a demonstration of	468
subject area competency, instead of or in combination with	469
completing hours of classroom instruction. The state board shall	470
adopt the plan not later than March 31, 2009, and commence	471
phasing in the plan during the 2009-2010 school year. The plan	472
shall include a standard method for recording demonstrated	473
proficiency on high school transcripts. Each school district and	474
community school shall comply with the state board's plan	475
adopted under this division and award units of high school	476
credit in accordance with the plan. The state board may adopt	477

existing methods for earning high school credit based on a

demonstration of subject area competency as necessary prior to	479
the 2009-2010 school year.	480
(K) This division does not apply to students who qualify	481
for graduation from high school under division (D) or (F) of	482
this section, or to students pursuing a career-technical	483
instructional track as determined by the school district board	484
of education or the chartered nonpublic school's governing	485
authority. Nevertheless, the general assembly encourages such	486
students to consider enrolling in a fine arts course as an	487
elective.	488
Beginning with students who enter ninth grade for the	489
first time on or after July 1, 2010, each student enrolled in a	490
public or chartered nonpublic high school shall complete two	491
semesters or the equivalent of fine arts to graduate from high	492
school. The coursework may be completed in any of grades seven	493
to twelve. Each student who completes a fine arts course in	494
grade seven or eight may elect to count that course toward the	495
five units of electives required for graduation under division	496
(C)(8) of this section, if the course satisfied the requirements	497
of division (G) of this section. In that case, the high school	498
shall award the student high school credit for the course and	499
count the course toward the five units required under division	500
(C)(8) of this section. If the course in grade seven or eight	501
did not satisfy the requirements of division (G) of this	502
section, the high school shall not award the student high school	503
credit for the course but shall count the course toward the two	504
semesters or the equivalent of fine arts required by this	505
division.	506
(L) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this	507
(b) Modernia canating any enting to the continuity in this	507

section, the board of education of each school district and the

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governing authority of each chartered nonpublic school may adopt	509
a policy to excuse from the high school physical education	510
requirement each student who, during high school, has	511
participated in interscholastic athletics, marching band, or	512
cheerleading for at least two full seasons or in the junior	513
reserve officer training corps for at least two full school	514
years. If the board or authority adopts such a policy, the board	515
or authority shall not require the student to complete any	516
physical education course as a condition to graduate. However,	517
the student shall be required to complete one-half unit,	518
consisting of at least sixty hours of instruction, in another	519
course of study. In the case of a student who has participated	520
in the junior reserve officer training corps for at least two	521
full school years, credit received for that participation may be	522
used to satisfy the requirement to complete one-half unit in	523
another course of study.	524
(M) It is important that high school students learn and	525
understand United States history and the governments of both the	526
United States and the state of Ohio. Therefore, beginning with	527
students who enter ninth grade for the first time on or after	528
July 1, 2012, the study of American history and American	529
government required by divisions (B)(6) and (C)(6) of this	530
section shall include the study of all of the following	531
documents:	532
(1) The Declaration of Independence;	533
(2) The Northwest Ordinance;	534
(3) The Constitution of the United States with emphasis on	535
the Bill of Rights;	536

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(4) The Ohio Constitution.

The study of each of the documents prescribed in divisions	538
(M)(1) to (4) of this section shall include study of that	539
document in its original context.	540
The study of American history and government required by	541
divisions (B)(6) and (C)(6) of this section shall include the	542
historical evidence of the role of documents such as the	543
Federalist Papers and the Anti-Federalist Papers to firmly	544
establish the historical background leading to the establishment	545
of the provisions of the Constitution and Bill of Rights.	546
Sec. 3313.6021. (A) As used in this section, "psychomotor	547
skills" means the use of hands-on practice to support cognitive	548
<pre>learning.</pre>	549
(B) Beginning with students who enter ninth grade for the	550
first time on or after July 1, 2016, except as provided in	551
division (F) of this section, each school district and chartered	552
