BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 59 O.S. 2011, Section 1423, as
renumbered by Section 5, Chapter 18, O.S.L. 2014, and as last
amended by Section 1, Chapter 101, O.S.L. 2016 (2 O.S. Supp. 2016,
Section 11-92), is amended to read as follows:

Section 11-92. A. Every scrap metal dealer shall keep a
separate book, record or other electronic system as authorized by
the Oklahoma Scrap Metal Dealers Act, to record and maintain the
following data from any seller of any amount of scrap metal as
defined by the Oklahoma Scrap Metal Dealers Act:

1 1. A legible photocopy of the seller's driver license or other
2 form of government issued photo identification that contains his or
3 her name, address, date of birth, weight and height;

4 2. Vehicle description and license tag number of the seller if
5 the vehicle was used to transport the material being sold;

6 3. Date and place of the transaction and the transaction number
7 as provided by the scrap metal dealer;

8 4. Description of the items sold and weight of the items as
9 required by the provisions of the Oklahoma Scrap Metal Dealers Act;

10 5. Whether the scrap metal is in wire, cable, bar, rod, sheet
11 or tube form;

12 6. If any insulation is on the scrap metal, the names and
13 addresses of the persons, groups or corporations from whom seller
14 purchased or obtained the materials; and

15 7. If apparent on the scrap metal, the name of the manufacturer
16 and serial number of each item of scrap metal.

17 B. Municipalities or other political subdivisions may prescribe
18 the reporting methods and the format of the information required by
19 subsection A of this section, either written, electronic or
20 internet-based.

21 C. Records required by this section shall be made available at
22 any time to any person authorized by law for such inspection.

23 D. Purchases of thirty-five (35) pounds or more of scrap metal
24 containing a manufacturer's serial number or other unique label or

1 mark shall be held separate and apart so that the purchased scrap
2 metal may be readily identifiable from all other purchases for a
3 period of not less than ten (10) days from the date of purchase.
4 During the holding period the scrap metal dealer may not change the
5 form of the purchased scrap metal and shall permit any person
6 authorized by law to make inspection of such materials.

7 E. Purchases of thirty-five (35) pounds or more of scrap metal
8 which does not contain a manufacturer's serial number or other
9 unique label or mark shall either be held for the same time and in
10 the same manner as required by subsection D of this section; or in
11 the alternative, the scrap metal dealer shall be required to obtain
12 a digital image of the items purchased, the seller of the items, a
13 copy of the bill of sale and a copy of the seller's photo
14 identification. The digital image shall contain a depiction that
15 can reasonably be utilized for identification of the seller and the
16 items sold and captured in the common JPEG format with a minimum
17 resolution of 640 pixels by 480 pixels. The digital image shall be
18 retained by the purchaser for a minimum of ninety (90) days from the
19 date of purchase. For the purpose of this section a "digital image"
20 means a raster-based two-dimensional, rectangular array of static
21 data elements called pixels, intended for display on a computer
22 monitor or for transformation into another format, such as a printed
23 page.

1 F. No purchase of any amount of scrap metal from an exempted
2 seller, as defined by Section 11-91 of this title, shall be subject
3 to any holding period or digital imaging identification required by
4 subsection D or E of this section.

5 G. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or purchase
6 copper material or copper wire from which the actual or apparent
7 insulation or other coating has been burned, melted or exposed to
8 heat or fire resulting in melting some or all of the insulation or
9 coating. This provision shall not apply to sales by or purchases
10 from an exempted seller.

11 H. It shall be unlawful for any scrap metal dealer to purchase
12 any item from a minor without having first obtained the consent, in
13 writing, of a parent or guardian of such minor. Such written
14 consent shall be kept with the book, record or other electronic
15 recording system required by subsection A of this section and, if
16 requested by a law enforcement agency where the purchase was made,
17 shall be transmitted to the law enforcement agency and may be kept
18 as a permanent record and made available for public inspection.

19 I. A scrap metal dealer shall obtain from each seller of a
20 scrap metal item regulated by the Oklahoma Scrap Metal Dealers Act,
21 or a parent or guardian on behalf of a minor, a written declaration
22 of ownership containing a legible signature of the seller. The
23 declaration of ownership shall be in the following form and shall
24 appear on the bill of sale or transaction ticket to be completed by

1 the seller in the presence of the purchaser at the time of the
2 transaction:

3 "I hereby affirm under penalty of prosecution that I am the
4 rightful owner of the hereon described merchandise; or I am an
5 authorized representative of the rightful owner and affirm that I
6 have been given authority by the rightful owner to sell the hereon
7 described merchandise.

10 J. If requested by a law enforcement agency, a scrap metal
11 dealer shall report in writing all purchases of scrap metal as
12 defined by the Oklahoma Scrap Metal Dealers Act within forty-eight
13 (48) hours following such purchase. The report shall contain all
14 the information required by this section.

15 K. A scrap metal dealer purchasing a vehicle from any person
16 shall be required to record the information required in subsection A
17 of this section and the make, model, license tag number and vehicle
18 identification number of the purchased vehicle. A person selling a
19 vehicle to a scrap metal dealer shall be required to present to the
20 dealer the title of the vehicle or a ~~verified bill of sale from the~~
21 ~~owner of the vehicle or other proof of ownership~~ certificate of
22 ownership form, as approved by the Oklahoma Tax Commission and
23 available at the Oklahoma Tax Commission or through a motor license
24 agent, in addition to signing a declaration of ownership as required

1 by subsection I of this section. The provisions of this subsection
2 shall not apply to sales, purchases or other transfer of vehicles
3 between scrap metal dealers and licensed automotive dismantlers and
4 parts recyclers.

5 L. The provisions of the Oklahoma Scrap Metal Dealers Act shall
6 not apply to the sale or purchase of aluminum beverage cans for
7 recycling purposes.

8 M. A scrap metal dealer shall not enter into any cash
9 transactions in excess of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) in
10 payment for the purchase of scrap metal that is listed in subsection
11 B of Section 11-93 of this title unless the transaction is made with
12 an exempted seller. Payment by check shall be issued and made
13 payable only to the seller of the scrap metal whose identification
14 information has been obtained pursuant to the provisions of this
15 section.

23 Section 1-6-103. A. Juvenile court records and Department of
24 Human Services agency records pertaining to a child may be

1 inspected, and their contents shall be disclosed, without a court
2 order to the following persons upon showing of proper credentials
3 and pursuant to their lawful duties:

4 1. The court having the child currently before it in any
5 proceeding pursuant to this title, any district court or tribal
6 court to which such proceedings may be transferred, employees and
7 officers of the court in the performance of their duties, including
8 but not limited to guardians ad litem appointed by the court, and
9 court-appointed special advocates;

10 2. A district attorney, United States Attorney, or Attorney
11 General of this or another state and the employees of such offices
12 in the course of their official duties pursuant to this title or the
13 prosecution of crimes against children, or upon their request in
14 their official capacity as advisor in a grand jury proceeding;

15 3. The attorney representing a child who is the subject of a
16 proceeding pursuant to the provisions of this title or other
17 proceeding where child custody or visitation is at issue;

18 4. Employees of juvenile bureaus in the course of their
19 official duties pursuant to this title, and employees of the
20 Department of Human Services in the course of their official duties;

21 5. Employees of a law enforcement agency of this or another
22 state or military enclave and employees of a child protective
23 service of another state or military enclave in the course of their
24 official duties pertaining to investigations of a report of known or

1 suspected child abuse or neglect or crimes against children or for
2 the purpose of determining whether to place a child in protective
3 custody;

4 6. The Oklahoma Commission on Children and Youth as provided by
5 Sections 601.2 and 601.6 of Title 10 of the Oklahoma Statutes;

6 7. The Office of Juvenile Affairs;

7 8. A federally recognized Indian tribe in which the child who
8 is the subject of the record is a member or is eligible to become a
9 member of the tribe and is the biological child of a member of an
10 Indian tribe pursuant to the provisions of the Federal Indian Child
11 Welfare Act and the Oklahoma Indian Child Welfare Act; provided such
12 Indian tribe, in the course of its official duties, is:

13 a. investigating a report of known or suspected child
14 abuse or neglect or crimes against children or for the
15 purpose of determining whether to place a child in
16 protective custody,

17 b. providing services to or for the benefit of a child
18 including, but not limited to, protective, emergency,
19 social and medical services, or

20 c. the tribe, the tribal court or the tribal child
21 welfare program has asserted jurisdiction or
22 intervened in any case in which the child is the
23 subject of the proceedings or is a party to the
24

1 proceedings pursuant to the authority provided in the
2 Oklahoma Indian Child Welfare Act.

3 The records that are to be provided to Indian tribes under this
4 subsection shall include all case records, reports, and documents as
5 defined in Section 1-6-101 of this title;

6 9. The Governor or to any person the Governor designates, in
7 writing;

8 10. Any federal official of the United States Department of
9 Health and Human Services;

10 11. Any member of the Legislature approved in writing by the
11 Speaker of the House of Representatives or the President Pro Tempore
12 of the Senate;

13 12. A foster parent, with regard to records concerning the
14 social, medical, psychological, or educational needs of a child
15 currently placed with that foster parent or of a child being
16 considered for placement with that foster parent;

17 13. An employee of any state or federal corrections or law
18 enforcement agency in the performance of the official duties of the
19 employee concerning presentence investigations or supervision of a
20 parent of an alleged or adjudicated deprived child, or the legal
21 guardian, custodian, or any other adult member of the child's home
22 who is responsible for the health, safety, or welfare of the child;

23 14. An employee of a state agency of this or another state in
24 the performance of the official duties of the employee concerning

1 the establishment of paternity or the establishment or enforcement
2 of a child support order or other entitlement for the benefit of a
3 child; provided, disclosure shall be limited to information directly
4 related to the purpose of such disclosure;

5 15. Any member of a city-county Health Department Fetal Infant
6 Mortality Review (FIMR) in the performance of the official duties of
7 the member concerning investigations of fetal and infant
8 mortalities; provided, disclosure shall be limited to information
9 directly related to the purpose of such disclosure; ~~and~~

10 16. Any designated federal authorities at the federal military
11 installation where a service member is assigned, when the child is a
12 member of an active duty military family, as provided by paragraph 4
13 of subsection A of Section 1-2-102 of this title; and

14 17. Any member of the Child Welfare Review Committee for the
15 Death and Near Death of Children With Disabilities as established by
16 Section 1-10-103 of this title.

17 B. In addition to the persons listed in subsection A of this
18 section, juvenile court records may be inspected, and their contents
19 shall be disclosed, without a court order to the following persons
20 upon showing of proper credentials and pursuant to their lawful
21 duties:

22 1. Employees of court-appointed special advocate programs, as
23 defined in Section 1-1-105 of this title, in the course of their
24 official duties pertaining to recruiting, screening, training,

1 assigning cases, supervising, and supporting volunteers in their
2 roles as guardian ad litem pursuant to Section 1-4-306 of this
3 title;

4 2. Members of postadjudication review boards established
5 pursuant to the provisions of Section 1116.2 of Title 10 of the
6 Oklahoma Statutes, the Child Death Review Board, and
7 multidisciplinary personnel. In addition to juvenile court records,
8 members of such postadjudication review boards may inspect, without
9 a court order, information that includes, but is not limited to:

- 10 a. psychological and medical records,
- 11 b. placement history and information, including the names
12 and addresses of foster parents,
- 13 c. family assessments,
- 14 d. treatment or service plans, and
- 15 e. school records;

16 3. The Department of Human Services or other public or private
17 agency or individual having court-ordered custody or physical
18 custody pursuant to Department placement of the child, or conducting
19 a child abuse or neglect investigation of the child who is the
20 subject of the record. In addition to juvenile court records,
21 employees of the Department may inspect, without a court order and
22 upon a showing of proper credentials and pursuant to their lawful
23 duties, information that includes, but is not limited to:

- 24 a. psychological and medical records, and

1 b. nondirectory education records;

2 4. The child who is the subject of the record and the parents,
3 legal guardian, custodian, or foster parent of such child; and

4 5. A person authorized by the court to conduct bona fide
5 research, provided such research may not publish the names or
6 identities of parents, children, or other persons contained in the
7 records.

8 C. In addition to the persons and entities named in subsection
9 A of this section, Department of Human Services agency records may
10 be inspected, and their contents shall be disclosed, without a court
11 order to the following persons upon showing of proper credentials
12 and pursuant to their lawful duties:

13 1. Postadjudicatory review boards, court-appointed special
14 advocates, and members of the Child Death Review Board;

15 2. Any district court which has ordered a home study by the
16 Department in an action for divorce, annulment, custody of a child,
17 or appointment of a legal guardian of a child, or any subsequent
18 proceeding in such actions; provided, however, the Department may
19 limit disclosure in the home study to summaries or to information
20 directly related to the purpose of the disclosure;

21 3. Members of multidisciplinary teams or multidisciplinary
22 personnel designated by the Department, investigating a report of
23 known or suspected child abuse or neglect or providing services to a
24 child or family which is the subject of the report;

1 4. A physician who has before him or her a child whom the
2 physician reasonably suspects may be abused or neglected or any
3 health care or mental health professionals involved in the
4 evaluation or treatment of the child or the parents, legal guardian,
5 foster parent, custodian, or other family members of the child;

6 5. Any public or private agency or person authorized by the
7 Department to diagnose, or provide care, treatment, supervision, or
8 other services to a child who is the subject of a report or record
9 of child abuse or neglect; provided, the Department may limit such
10 disclosure to summaries or to information directly necessary for the
11 purpose of such disclosure;

12 6. Any person or agency for research purposes, if all of the
13 following conditions are met:

14 a. the person or agency conducting the research is
15 employed by the State of Oklahoma or is under contract
16 with this state and is authorized by the Department to
17 conduct the research, and

18 b. the person or agency conducting the research ensures
19 that all documents containing identifying information
20 are maintained in secure locations and access to the
21 documents by unauthorized persons is prohibited; that
22 no identifying information is included in documents
23 generated from the research conducted; and that all

1 identifying information is deleted from documents used
2 in the research when the research is completed;

3 7. The Oklahoma Health Care Authority; and

4 8. A medical examiner when such person is determining the cause
5 of death of a child.

6 D. In accordance with the rules promulgated for such purpose
7 pursuant to Section 620.6 of Title 10 of the Oklahoma Statutes,
8 records listed in subsection A of Section 1-6-102 of this title may
9 be inspected and their contents disclosed without a court order to
10 participating agencies.

11 E. The court may disclose to an employee of an out-of-state
12 entity, licensed to perform adoption home studies in that state,
13 whether the prospective adoptive parent has had parental rights to a
14 child terminated in Oklahoma or whether the prospective adoptive
15 parent has relinquished parental rights to a child in Oklahoma.

16 F. Nothing in this section shall be construed as prohibiting
17 the Department from disclosing such confidential information as may
18 be necessary to secure appropriate care, treatment, protection or
19 supervision of a child alleged to be abused or neglected.

13 Section 1277.

14 UNLAWFUL CARRY IN CERTAIN PLACES

15 A. It shall be unlawful for any person in possession of a valid
16 handgun license issued pursuant to the provisions of the Oklahoma
17 Self-Defense Act to carry any concealed or unconcealed handgun into
18 any of the following places:

19 1. Any structure, building, or office space which is owned or
20 leased by a city, town, county, state or federal governmental
21 authority for the purpose of conducting business with the public;

22 2. Any courthouse, courtroom, prison, jail, detention facility
23 or any facility used to process, hold or house arrested persons,
24 prisoners or persons alleged delinquent or adjudicated delinquent,

1 except as provided in Section 21 of Title 57 of the Oklahoma
2 Statutes;

3 3. Any public or private elementary or public or private
4 secondary school, except as provided in subsections C and D of this
5 section;

6 4. Any publicly owned or operated sports arena or venue during
7 a professional sporting event, unless allowed by the event holder;

8 5. Any place where ~~pari-mutuel wagering~~ gambling is authorized
9 by law, unless allowed by the property owner; and

10 6. Any other place specifically prohibited by law.

11 B. For purposes of ~~paragraphs 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5~~ of subsection A
12 of this section, the prohibited place does not include and
13 specifically excludes the following property:

14 1. Any property set aside for the use or parking of any
15 vehicle, whether attended or unattended, by a city, town, county,
16 state or federal governmental authority;

17 2. Any property set aside for the use or parking of any
18 vehicle, whether attended or unattended, ~~by any entity offering any~~
19 ~~professional sporting event~~ which is open to the public ~~for~~
20 ~~admission~~, or by any entity engaged in ~~pari-mutuel wagering~~ gambling
21 authorized by law;

22 3. Any property adjacent to a structure, building or office
23 space in which concealed or unconcealed weapons are prohibited by
24 the provisions of this section;

1 4. Any property designated by a city, town, county or state
2 governmental authority as a park, recreational area, or fairgrounds;
3 provided, nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to authorize
4 any entry by a person in possession of a concealed or unconcealed
5 handgun into any structure, building or office space which is
6 specifically prohibited by the provisions of subsection A of this
7 section; and

8 5. Any property set aside by a public or private elementary or
9 secondary school for the use or parking of any vehicle, whether
10 attended or unattended; provided, however, said handgun shall be
11 stored and hidden from view in a locked motor vehicle when the motor
12 vehicle is left unattended on school property.

13 Nothing contained in any provision of this subsection or
14 subsection C of this section shall be construed to authorize or
15 allow any person in control of any place described in ~~paragraph 1,~~
16 ~~2, 3, 4 or 5~~ of subsection A of this section to establish any policy
17 or rule that has the effect of prohibiting any person in lawful
18 possession of a handgun license from possession of a handgun
19 allowable under such license in places described in ~~paragraph 1, 2,~~
20 ~~3, 4 or 5~~ of this subsection.

21 C. A concealed or unconcealed weapon may be carried onto
22 private school property or in any school bus or vehicle used by any
23 private school for transportation of students or teachers by a
24 person who is licensed pursuant to the Oklahoma Self-Defense Act,

1 provided a policy has been adopted by the governing entity of the
2 private school that authorizes the carrying and possession of a
3 weapon on private school property or in any school bus or vehicle
4 used by a private school. Except for acts of gross negligence or
5 willful or wanton misconduct, a governing entity of a private school
6 that adopts a policy which authorizes the possession of a weapon on
7 private school property, a school bus or vehicle used by the private
8 school shall be immune from liability for any injuries arising from
9 the adoption of the policy. The provisions of this subsection shall
10 not apply to claims pursuant to the ~~Workers' Compensation Code~~
11 Administrative Workers' Compensation Act.

12 D. Notwithstanding paragraph 3 of subsection A of this section,
13 a board of education of a school district may adopt a policy
14 pursuant to Section 5-149.2 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes to
15 authorize the carrying of a handgun onto school property by school
16 personnel specifically designated by the board of education,
17 provided such personnel either:

- 18 1. Possess a valid armed security guard license as provided for
19 in Section 1750.1 et seq. of Title 59 of the Oklahoma Statutes; or
- 20 2. Hold a valid reserve peace officer certification as provided
21 for in Section 3311 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes.

22 Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to restrict authority
23 granted elsewhere in law to carry firearms.

24

1 E. Any person violating the provisions of paragraphs 2 or 3 of
2 subsection A of this section shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a
3 misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed Two Hundred Fifty
4 Dollars (\$250.00). A person violating any other provision of
5 subsection A of this section may be denied entrance onto the
6 property or removed from the property. If the person refuses to
7 leave the property and a peace officer is summoned, the person may
8 be issued a citation for an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Fifty
9 Dollars (\$250.00).

10 F. No person in possession of a valid handgun license issued
11 pursuant to the provisions of the Oklahoma Self-Defense Act shall be
12 authorized to carry the handgun into or upon any college, university
13 or technology center school property, except as provided in this
14 subsection. For purposes of this subsection, the following property
15 shall not be construed as prohibited for persons having a valid
16 handgun license:

17 1. Any property set aside for the use or parking of any
18 vehicle, whether attended or unattended, provided the handgun is
19 carried or stored as required by law and the handgun is not removed
20 from the vehicle without the prior consent of the college or
21 university president or technology center school administrator while
22 the vehicle is on any college, university or technology center
23 school property;

24

1 2. Any property authorized for possession or use of handguns by
2 college, university or technology center school policy; and

3 3. Any property authorized by the written consent of the
4 college or university president or technology center school
5 administrator, provided the written consent is carried with the
6 handgun and the valid handgun license while on college, university
7 or technology center school property.

8 The college, university or technology center school may notify
9 the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation within ten (10) days of a
10 violation of any provision of this subsection by a licensee. Upon
11 receipt of a written notification of violation, the Bureau shall
12 give a reasonable notice to the licensee and hold a hearing. At the
13 hearing, upon a determination that the licensee has violated any
14 provision of this subsection, the licensee may be subject to an
15 administrative fine of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) and may
16 have the handgun license suspended for three (3) months.

17 Nothing contained in any provision of this subsection shall be
18 construed to authorize or allow any college, university or
19 technology center school to establish any policy or rule that has
20 the effect of prohibiting any person in lawful possession of a
21 handgun license from possession of a handgun allowable under such
22 license in places described in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 of this
23 subsection. Nothing contained in any provision of this subsection
24 shall be construed to limit the authority of any college, university

1 or technology center school in this state from taking administrative
2 action against any student for any violation of any provision of
3 this subsection.

4 G. The provisions of this section shall not apply to any peace
5 officer or to any person authorized by law to carry a pistol in the
6 course of employment. District judges, associate district judges
7 and special district judges, who are in possession of a valid
8 handgun license issued pursuant to the provisions of the Oklahoma
9 Self-Defense Act and whose names appear on a list maintained by the
10 Administrative Director of the Courts, shall be exempt from this
11 section when acting in the course and scope of employment within the
12 courthouses of this state. Private investigators with a firearms
13 authorization shall be exempt from this section when acting in the
14 course and scope of employment.

15 H. For the purposes of this section, "motor vehicle" means any
16 automobile, truck, minivan or sports utility vehicle.

17 SECTION 10. REPEALER 21 O.S. 2011, Section 1277, as last
18 amended by Section 1, Chapter 18, O.S.L. 2016 (21 O.S. Supp. 2016,
19 Section 1277), is hereby repealed.

20 SECTION 11. AMENDATORY 22 O.S. 2011, Section 988.2, as
21 last amended by Section 3, Chapter 222, O.S.L. 2016 (22 O.S. Supp.
22 2016, Section 988.2), is amended to read as follows:

23 Section 988.2. A. For purposes of the Oklahoma Community
24 Sentencing Act:

1 1. "Local community sentencing system" means the use of public
2 and private entities to deliver services to the sentencing court for
3 punishment of eligible felony offenders under the authority of a
4 community sentence;

5 2. "Community sentence" or "community punishment" means a
6 punishment imposed by the court as a condition of a deferred or
7 suspended sentence for an eligible offender;

8 3. "Continuum of sanctions" means a variety of coercive
9 measures and treatment options ranked by degrees of public safety,
10 punitive effect, and cost benefit which are available to the
11 sentencing judge as punishment for criminal conduct;

12 4. "Community sentencing system planning council" or "planning
13 council" means a group of citizens and elected officials specified
14 by law or appointed by the Chief Judge of the Judicial District
15 which plans the local community sentencing system and with the
16 assistance of the Community Sentencing Division of the Department of
17 Corrections locates treatment providers and resources to support the
18 local community sentencing system;

19 5. "Incentive" means a court-ordered reduction in the terms or
20 conditions of a community sentence which is given for exceptional
21 performance or progress by the offender;

22 6. "Disciplinary sanction" means a court-ordered punishment in
23 response to a technical or noncompliance violation of a community
24

1 sentence which increases in intensity or duration with each
2 successive violation;

3 7. "Division" means the Community Sentencing Division within
4 the Department of Corrections which is the state administration
5 agency for the Oklahoma Community Sentencing Act, the statewide
6 community sentencing system, and all local community sentencing
7 systems;

8 8. "Eligible offender" means a felony offender who has been
9 convicted of or who has entered a plea other than not guilty to a
10 felony offense and who upon completion of a Level of Services
11 Inventory or another assessment instrument has been found to be in a
12 range other than the low range, who has been convicted of at least
13 one prior felony, and who is not otherwise prohibited by law, or is
14 a person who has had an assessment authorized by Section 3-704 of
15 Title 43A of the Oklahoma Statutes and the assessment recommends
16 community sentencing. Provided, however, that no person who has
17 been convicted of or who has entered a plea other than not guilty to
18 an offense enumerated in paragraph 2 of Section 571 of Title 57 of
19 the Oklahoma Statutes, ~~as an exception to the definition of~~
20 ~~"nonviolent offense"~~ shall be eligible for a community sentence or
21 community punishment unless the district attorney or an assistant
22 district attorney for the district in which the offender's
23 conviction was obtained consents thereto. The district attorney may
24 consent to eligibility for an offender who has a mental illness or a

1 developmental disability or a co-occurring mental illness and
2 substance abuse disorder and who scores in the low range on the LSI
3 or has an assessment authorized by Section 3-704 of Title 43A of the
4 Oklahoma Statutes or another assessment instrument if the offender
5 is not otherwise prohibited by law. Any consent by a district
6 attorney shall be made a part of the record of the case; and

7 9. "Statewide community sentencing system" means a network of
8 all counties through their respective local community sentencing
9 systems serving the state judicial system and offering support
10 services to each other through reciprocal and interlocal agreements
11 and interagency cooperation.

12 B. For the purposes of the Oklahoma Community Sentencing Act,
13 if a judicial district does not have a Chief Judge or if a judicial
14 district has more than one Chief Judge, the duties of the Chief
15 Judge provided for in the Oklahoma Community Sentencing Act shall be
16 performed by the Presiding Judge of the Judicial Administrative
17 District.

1 SECTION 14. AMENDATORY 47 O.S. 2011, Section 6-105, as
2 last amended by Section 2, Chapter 180, O.S.L. 2016 (47 O.S. Supp.
3 2016, Section 6-105), is amended to read as follows:

4 Section 6-105. A. Unless a legal custodial parent or legal
5 guardian has filed an objection to licensure pursuant to Section 6-
6 103.1 of this title, any person under eighteen (18) years of age who
7 is in compliance with or not subject to Section 6-107.3 of this
8 title may be permitted to operate:

9 1. A Class D motor vehicle under the graduated driver license
10 provisions prescribed in subsections B through E of this section;

11 2. A motorcycle under the provisions prescribed in subsection H
12 of this section; or

13 3. A farm vehicle under the provisions prescribed in subsection
14 I of this section.

15 B. Any person who is at least fifteen (15) years of age may
16 drive during a session in which the driver is being instructed in a
17 driver education course, as set out in subparagraphs a, b, c and, d
18 and e of paragraph 1 of subsection C of this section, by a certified
19 driver education instructor who is seated in the right front seat of
20 the motor vehicle.

21 C. Any person:

22 1. Who is at least fifteen and one-half (15 1/2) years of age
23 and is currently receiving instruction in or has successfully
24

1 completed driver education. For purposes of this section, the term
2 "driver education" shall mean:

- 3 a. a prescribed secondary school driver education course,
4 as provided for in Sections 19-113 through 19-121 of
5 Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes,
- 6 b. a driver education course, certified by the Department
7 of Public Safety, from a parochial, private, or other
8 nonpublic secondary school,
- 9 c. a commercial driver training course, as defined by
10 Sections 801 through 808 of this title,
- 11 d. a parent-taught driver education course, certified by
12 the Department of Public Safety. The Department shall
13 promulgate rules for any parent-taught driver
14 education course, or
- 15 e. a driver education course certified by a state other
16 than Oklahoma; or

17 2. Who is at least sixteen (16) years of age,
18 may, upon successfully passing all parts of the driver license
19 examination administered by the Department except the driving
20 examination, be issued a learner permit which will grant the
21 permittee the privilege to operate a Class D motor vehicle upon the
22 public highways only between the hours of 5:00 a.m. and 10:00 p.m.
23 and while accompanied by a licensed driver who is at least twenty-
24 one (21) years of age and who is actually occupying a seat beside

1 the permittee; provided, the written examination for a learner
2 permit may be waived by the Department of Public Safety upon
3 verification that the person has successfully completed driver
4 education.

5 D. 1. Any person:

6 a. who has applied for, been issued, and has possessed a
7 learner permit for a minimum of six (6) months, and

8 b. whose custodial legal parent or legal guardian

9 certifies to the Department by sworn affidavit that

10 the person has received a minimum of fifty (50) hours

11 of actual behind-the-wheel training, of which at least

12 ten (10) hours of such training was at night, from a

13 licensed driver who was at least twenty-one (21) years

14 of age and who was properly licensed to operate a

15 Class D motor vehicle for a minimum of two (2) years,

16 may be issued an intermediate Class D license upon successfully

17 passing all parts of the driver license examinations administered by

18 the Department; provided, the written examination, if it has not

19 previously been administered or waived, may be waived by the

20 Department upon verification that the person has successfully

21 completed driver education or the driving examination may be waived

22 by the Department upon successful passage of the examination

23 administered by a certified designated examiner, as provided for in

24 Section 6-110 of this title. However, notwithstanding the date of

1 issuance of the learner permit, if the person has been convicted of
2 a traffic offense which is reported on the driving record of that
3 person, the time period specified in subparagraph a of this
4 paragraph shall be recalculated to begin from the date of conviction
5 for the traffic offense, and must elapse before that person may be
6 issued an intermediate Class D license. If the person has been
7 convicted of more than one traffic offense which is reported on the
8 driving record of that person, the time period specified in
9 subparagraph a of this paragraph shall be recalculated to begin from
10 the most recent date of conviction, and must elapse before that
11 person may be issued an intermediate Class D license.

12 2. A person who has been issued an intermediate Class D license
13 under the provisions of this subsection:

14 a. shall be granted the privilege to operate a Class D
15 motor vehicle upon the public highways:

16 (1) only between the hours of 5:00 a.m. and 10:00
17 p.m., except for driving to and from work,
18 school, school activities, and church activities,
19 or

20 (2) at any time, if a licensed driver who is at least
21 twenty-one (21) years of age is actually
22 occupying a seat beside the intermediate Class D
23 licensee, or if the intermediate Class D licensee
24 is a farm or ranch resident, and is operating a

1 motor vehicle while engaged in farming or
2 ranching operations outside the limits of a
3 municipality, or driving to and from work,
4 school, school activities, or church activities,
5 and

6 b. shall not operate a motor vehicle with more than one
7 passenger unless:

8 (1) all passengers live in the same household as the
9 custodial legal parent or legal guardian, or

10 (2) a licensed driver at least twenty-one (21) years
11 of age is actually occupying a seat beside the
12 intermediate Class D licensee.

13 E. Any person who has been issued an intermediate Class D
14 license for a minimum of:

15 1. One (1) year; or

16 2. Six (6) months, if the person has completed both the driver
17 education and the parent-certified behind-the-wheel training
18 provisions of subparagraph b of paragraph 1 of subsection D of this
19 section,

20 may be issued a Class D license. However, notwithstanding the date
21 of issuance of the Class D license, if the person has been convicted
22 of a traffic offense which is reported on the driving record of that
23 person, the time periods specified in paragraph 1 or 2 of this
24 subsection, as applicable, shall be recalculated to begin from the

1 date of conviction for the traffic offense, and must elapse before
2 that person may be issued a Class D license. If the person has been
3 convicted of more than one traffic offense which is reported on the
4 driving record of that person, the time periods specified in
5 paragraph 1 or 2 of this subsection, as applicable, shall be
6 recalculated to begin from the most recent date of conviction, and
7 must elapse before that person may be issued a Class D license.

8 F. Learner permits and intermediate Class D licenses shall be
9 issued for the same period as all other driver licenses. The
10 licenses may be suspended or canceled at the discretion of the
11 Department for violation of restrictions, for failing to give the
12 required or correct information on the application, for knowingly
13 giving false or inaccurate information on the application or any
14 subsequent documentation related to the granting of driving
15 privileges, for using a hand-held electronic device while operating
16 a motor vehicle for non-life-threatening emergency purposes or for
17 violation of any traffic laws of this state pertaining to the
18 operation of a motor vehicle.

19 G. The Department of Public Safety shall promulgate rules
20 establishing procedures for removal of learner permit and
21 intermediate Class D license restrictions from the permit or license
22 upon the permittee or licensee qualifying for a less restricted or
23 an unrestricted license.

1 H. Any person fourteen (14) years of age or older may apply for
2 a restricted Class D license with a motorcycle-only restriction.
3 After the person has successfully passed all parts of the motorcycle
4 examination other than the driving examination, has successfully
5 completed a certified state-approved motorcycle basic rider course
6 approved by the Department, and has met all requirements provided
7 for in the rules of the Department, the Department shall issue to
8 the person a restricted Class D license with a motorcycle-only
9 restriction which shall grant to the person, while having the
10 license in the person's immediate possession, the privilege to
11 operate a motorcycle or motor-driven cycle:

12 1. With a piston displacement not to exceed three hundred (300)
13 cubic centimeters;

14 2. Between the hours of 4:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. only;

15 3. While wearing approved protective headgear; and

16 4. While accompanied by and receiving instruction from any
17 person who is at least twenty-one (21) years of age and who is
18 properly licensed pursuant to the laws of this state to operate a
19 motorcycle or motor-driven cycle, and who has visual contact with
20 the restricted licensee.

21 The restricted licensee may apply on or after thirty (30) days
22 from date of issuance of the restricted Class D license with a
23 motorcycle-only restriction to have the restriction of being
24

1 accompanied by a licensed driver removed by successfully completing
2 the driving portion of an examination.

3 The written examination and driving examination for a restricted
4 Class D license with a motorcycle-only endorsement shall be waived
5 by the Department of Public Safety upon verification that the person
6 has successfully completed a certified state-approved motorcycle
7 basic rider course approved by the Department.

8 I. The Department may in its discretion issue a special permit
9 to any person who has attained the age of fourteen (14) years,
10 authorizing such person to operate farm vehicles between the farm
11 and the market to haul commodities grown on the farm; provided, that
12 the special permit shall be temporary and shall expire not more than
13 thirty (30) days after the issuance of the special permit. Special
14 permits shall be issued only to farm residents and shall be issued
15 only during the time of the harvest of the principal crops grown on
16 such farm. Provided, however, the Department shall not issue a
17 special permit pursuant to this subsection until the Department is
18 fully satisfied after the examination of the application and other
19 evidence furnished in support thereof, that the person is physically

5 function on an electronic device.

6 K. All driver education courses provided for in paragraph 1 of
7 subsection C of this section shall include education regarding the
8 dangers of texting while driving and the effects of being under the
9 influence of alcohol or other intoxicating substance while driving.

16 Section 7-606. A. 1. An owner or operator who fails to comply
17 with the Compulsory Insurance Law, ~~or who fails to produce for~~
18 ~~inspection a valid and current security verification form or~~
19 ~~equivalent form which has been issued by the Department of Public~~
20 ~~Safety upon request of any peace officer, representative of the~~
21 ~~Department of Public Safety or other authorized person,~~ shall be
22 guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be subject to a
23 fine of not more than Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00), or
24 imprisonment for not more than thirty (30) days, or by both such

1 fine and imprisonment, and, in addition thereto, shall be subject to
2 suspension of the driving privilege of the person in accordance with
3 Section 7-605 of this title; provided, that if a requesting law
4 enforcement officer verifies valid and current security and
5 compliance with the Compulsory Insurance Law through the online
6 verification system, there shall be no violation of the Compulsory
7 Insurance Law and no citation shall be issued. Upon issuing a
8 citation under this paragraph, the law enforcement officer issuing
9 the citation may:

- 10 a. seize the vehicle being operated by the person and
11 cause the vehicle to be towed and stored as provided
12 by subsection ~~B~~ A of Section 955 of this title, if the
13 officer has probable cause to believe that the vehicle
14 is not insured as required by the Compulsory Insurance
15 Law of this state, or
- 16 b. seize the license plate of the vehicle and issue the
17 citation to the vehicle operator, provided that the
18 vehicle is in a drivable condition at the time of
19 issuing the citation. A copy of the citation retained
20 by the owner or operator of the vehicle shall serve as
21 the temporary license plate of the vehicle for up to
22 ten (10) calendar days after the issuance of the
23 citation. After ten (10) calendar days, the vehicle
24 shall not be used until the vehicle operator or owner

1 completes the requirements to retrieve the license
2 plate.

3 (1) After the issuance of the citation, and if the
4 charges are to be filed in district court, the
5 law enforcement agency issuing the citation
6 shall, within three (3) days, deposit the license
7 plate and deliver a copy of the citation to the
8 county sheriff's office of the county where the
9 violation has occurred. If the charges are to be
10 filed in municipal court, the law enforcement
11 agency issuing the citation may deposit the
12 license plate within their own agency. The
13 county sheriff's office or municipal police
14 department that is storing the license plate
15 shall provide the plan administrator with the
16 seized license plate number by entering the
17 required information into the statewide database
18 maintained by the plan administrator. The plan
19 administrator shall maintain a database including
20 all seized license plates and shall submit such
21 information to the Oklahoma Tax Commission.

22 (2) The vehicle owner or operator may retrieve the
23 license plate from the county sheriff's office or
24 municipal police department upon providing

1 verification of compliance with the Compulsory
2 Insurance Law, payment in full of an
3 administrative fee of One Hundred Twenty-five
4 Dollars (\$125.00) to the county sheriff's office
5 or municipal police department and payment in
6 full of the citation to the court clerk. The
7 county sheriff's office or municipal police
8 department shall transfer the administrative fee
9 to the Plan Administrator. The Plan
10 Administrator shall notify the Oklahoma Tax
11 Commission that the vehicle owner or operator is
12 in compliance with this division and shall
13 distribute the administrative fee as follows:

14 (a) Twenty Dollars (\$20.00) of the fee shall be
15 distributed to the county sheriff's office
16 or municipal police department that stored
17 the seized license plate to defray any
18 expenses involved in the storage of the
19 license plate,

20 (b) Seventy Dollars (\$70.00) of the fee shall be
21 transferred to the law enforcement agency
22 which issued the citation and may be used
23 for any lawful purpose,
24

- 1 (c) Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) of the fee
2 shall be transferred to the Temporary
3 Insurance Premium Pool,
4 (d) the Plan Administrator shall retain Ten
5 Dollars (\$10.00) of the fee, and
6 (e) if, by the end of the second business day
7 immediately following the date of citation,
8 a person produces proof to the law
9 enforcement agency that issued the citation
10 and is storing the seized license plate that
11 a current security verification form or
12 equivalent form which has been issued by the
13 Department of Public Safety reflecting
14 liability coverage for the person was in
15 force at the time of the alleged offense,
16 the person shall not be required to pay the
17 administrative fee required by this
18 division. If no such proof is presented
19 within that time, the person shall pay the
20 full administrative fee required by this
21 division, regardless of whether the person
22 had minimum auto liability insurance
23 coverage at the time of citation.
24

1 (3) The county sheriff's office or municipal police
2 department may dispose of any unclaimed license
3 plate after ninety (90) days according to
4 applicable state law. After the license plate
5 has been disposed of by the county sheriff's
6 office or municipal police department, the
7 operator or owner shall be required to obtain a
8 new license plate pursuant to all existing
9 requirements.

10 If the operator of the vehicle produces what appears to be a valid
11 security verification form and the officer is unable to confirm
12 compliance through the online verification system or noncompliance
13 by a subsequent investigation, the officer shall be prohibited from
14 seizing the license plate or seizing the vehicle and causing such
15 vehicle to be towed and stored. Further, no vehicle shall be seized
16 and towed under the provisions of this paragraph if the vehicle is
17 displaying a temporary license plate that has not expired pursuant
18 to the provisions of Sections 1137.1 and 1137.3 of this title.

19 2. An owner other than an owner of an antique or a classic
20 automobile as defined by the Oklahoma Tax Commission who files an
21 affidavit that a vehicle shall not be driven upon the public
22 highways or public streets, pursuant to Section 7-607 of this title,
23 who drives or permits the driving of the vehicle upon the public
24 highways or public streets, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and

1 upon conviction thereof shall be subject to a fine of not more than
2 Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), or imprisonment for not more than
3 thirty (30) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, and in
4 addition thereto, shall be subject to suspension of the driving
5 privilege of the person in accordance with Section 7-605 of this
6 title.

7 B. A sentence imposed for any violation of the Compulsory
8 Insurance Law may be suspended or deferred in whole or in part by
9 the court.

10 C. Any person producing proof in court that a current security
11 verification form or equivalent form which has been issued by the
12 Department of Public Safety reflecting liability coverage for the
13 person was in force at the time of the alleged offense shall be
14 entitled to dismissal of the charge. If proof of security
15 verification is presented to the court by no later than the business
16 day preceding the first scheduled court appearance date, the
17 dismissal shall be without payment of court costs. The court may
18 access information from the online verification system to confirm
19 liability coverage. The court shall not dismiss the fine unless
20 proof that liability coverage for the person was in force at the
21 time of the alleged offense is presented to the court.

22 D. Upon conviction or bond forfeiture, the court clerk shall
23 forward an abstract to the Department of Public Safety within five
24 (5) days reflecting the action taken by the court.

1 E. For purposes of this section, "court" means any court in
2 this state.

3 SECTION 17. REPEALER 47 O.S. 2011, Section 7-606, as
4 last amended by Section 2, Chapter 88, O.S.L. 2016 (47 O.S. Supp.
5 2016, Section 7-606), is hereby repealed.

6 SECTION 18. AMENDATORY 47 O.S. 2011, Section 11-902, as
7 last amended by Section 1, Chapter 196, O.S.L. 2016 (47 O.S. Supp.
8 2016, Section 11-902), is amended to read as follows:

9 Section 11-902. A. It is unlawful and punishable as provided
10 in this section for any person to drive, operate, or be in actual
11 physical control of a motor vehicle within this state, whether upon
12 public roads, highways, streets, turnpikes, other public places or
13 upon any private road, street, alley or lane which provides access
14 to one or more single or multi-family dwellings, who:

15 1. Has a blood or breath alcohol concentration, as defined in
16 Section 756 of this title, of eight-hundredths (0.08) or more at the
17 time of a test of such person's blood or breath administered within
18 two (2) hours after the arrest of such person;

19 2. Is under the influence of alcohol;

20 3. Has any amount of a Schedule I chemical or controlled
21 substance, as defined in Section 2-204 of Title 63 of the Oklahoma
22 Statutes, or one of its metabolites or analogs in the person's
23 blood, saliva, urine or any other bodily fluid at the time of a test
24

1 of such person's blood, saliva, urine or any other bodily fluid
2 administered within two (2) hours after the arrest of such person;

3 4. Is under the influence of any intoxicating substance other
4 than alcohol which may render such person incapable of safely
5 driving or operating a motor vehicle; or

6 5. Is under the combined influence of alcohol and any other
7 intoxicating substance which may render such person incapable of
8 safely driving or operating a motor vehicle.

9 B. The fact that any person charged with a violation of this
10 section is or has been lawfully entitled to use alcohol or a
11 controlled dangerous substance or any other intoxicating substance
12 shall not constitute a defense against any charge of violating this
13 section.

14 C. 1. Any person who is convicted of a violation of the
15 provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor for the
16 first offense and shall:

- 17 a. participate in an assessment and evaluation pursuant
18 to subsection G of this section and shall follow all
19 recommendations made in the assessment and evaluation,
20 b. be punished by imprisonment in jail for not less than
21 ten (10) days nor more than one (1) year, and
22 c. be fined not more than One Thousand Dollars
23 (\$1,000.00).

1 2. Any person who, having been convicted of or having received
2 deferred judgment for a violation of this section or a violation
3 pursuant to the provisions of any law of this state or another state
4 prohibiting the offenses provided in this section, Section 11-904 of
5 this title or paragraph 4 of subsection A of Section 852.1 of Title
6 21 of the Oklahoma Statutes, or having a prior conviction in a
7 municipal criminal court of record for the violation of a municipal
8 ordinance prohibiting the offense provided for in this section
9 commits a subsequent violation of this section within ten (10) years
10 of the date following the completion of the execution of said
11 sentence or deferred judgment, and against whom the district
12 attorney seeks to enhance punishment pursuant to the provision of
13 this section, shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a felony and
14 shall participate in an assessment and evaluation pursuant to
15 subsection G of this section and shall be sentenced to:

- 16 a. follow all recommendations made in the assessment and
17 evaluation for treatment at the defendant's expense,
18 or
- 19 b. placement in the custody of the Department of
20 Corrections for not less than one (1) year and not to
21 exceed five (5) years and a fine of not more than Two
22 Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00), or

23
24

1 c. treatment, imprisonment and a fine within the
2 limitations prescribed in subparagraphs a and b of
3 this paragraph.

4 However, if the treatment in subsection G of this section does
5 not include residential or inpatient treatment for a period of not
6 less than five (5) days, the person shall serve a term of
7 imprisonment of at least five (5) days.

8 3. Any person who commits a violation of this section after
9 having been convicted of a felony offense pursuant to the provisions
10 of this section or a violation pursuant to the provisions of any law
11 of this state or another state prohibiting the offenses provided for
12 in this section, Section 11-904 of this title or paragraph 4 of
13 subsection A of Section 852.1 of Title 21 of the Oklahoma Statutes,
14 and against whom the district attorney seeks to enhance punishment,
15 shall be guilty of a felony and participate in an assessment and
16 evaluation pursuant to subsection G of this section and shall be
17 sentenced to:

18 a. follow all recommendations made in the assessment and
19 evaluation for treatment at the defendant's expense,
20 two hundred forty (240) hours of community service and
21 use of an ignition interlock device, as provided by
22 subparagraph n of paragraph 1 of subsection A of
23 Section 991a of Title 22 of the Oklahoma Statutes, or
24

- 1 b. placement in the custody of the Department of
2 Corrections for not less than one (1) year and not to
3 exceed ten (10) years and a fine of not more than Five
4 Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or
- 5 c. treatment, imprisonment and a fine within the
6 limitations prescribed in subparagraphs a and b of
7 this paragraph.

8 However, if the treatment in subsection G of this section does
9 not include residential or inpatient treatment for a period of not
10 less than ten (10) days, the person shall serve a term of
11 imprisonment of at least ten (10) days.

12 4. Any person who commits a violation of this section after
13 having been twice convicted of a felony offense pursuant to the
14 provisions of this section or a violation pursuant to the provisions
15 of any law of this state or another state prohibiting the offenses
16 provided for in this section, Section 11-904 of this title or
17 paragraph 4 of subsection A of Section 852.1 of Title 21 of the
18 Oklahoma Statutes, and against whom the district attorney seeks to
19 enhance punishment, shall be guilty of a felony and participate in
20 an assessment and evaluation pursuant to subsection G of this
21 section and shall be sentenced to:

- 22 a. follow all recommendations made in the assessment and
23 evaluation for treatment at the defendant's expense,
24 followed by not less than one (1) year of supervision

1 and periodic testing at the defendant's expense, four
2 hundred eighty (480) hours of community service, and
3 use of an ignition interlock device, as provided by
4 subparagraph n of paragraph 1 of subsection A of
5 Section 991a of Title 22 of the Oklahoma Statutes, for
6 a minimum of thirty (30) days, or

7 b. placement in the custody of the Department of
8 Corrections for not less than one (1) year and not to
9 exceed twenty (20) years and a fine of not more than
10 Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or

11 c. treatment, imprisonment and a fine within the
12 limitations prescribed in subparagraphs a and b of
13 this paragraph.

14 However, if the person does not undergo residential or inpatient
15 treatment pursuant to subsection G of this section the person shall
16 serve a term of imprisonment of at least ten (10) days.

17 5. Any person who, after a previous conviction of a violation
18 of murder in the second degree or manslaughter in the first degree
19 in which the death was caused as a result of driving under the
20 influence of alcohol or other intoxicating substance, is convicted
21 of a violation of this section shall be guilty of a felony and shall
22 be punished by imprisonment in the custody of the Department of
23 Corrections for not less than five (5) years and not to exceed
24

1 twenty (20) years, and a fine of not more than Ten Thousand Dollars
2 (\$10,000.00).

3 6. Provided, however, a conviction from another state shall not
4 be used to enhance punishment pursuant to the provisions of this
5 subsection if that conviction is based on a blood or breath alcohol
6 concentration of less than eight-hundredths (0.08).

7 7. In any case in which a defendant is charged with ~~a second or~~
8 ~~subsequent~~ driving under the influence of alcohol or other
9 intoxicating substance offense within any municipality with a
10 municipal court other than a court of record, the charge shall be
11 presented to the county's district attorney and filed with the
12 district court of the county within which the municipality is
13 located.

14 D. Any person who is convicted of a violation of driving under
15 the influence with a blood or breath alcohol concentration of
16 fifteen-hundredths (0.15) or more pursuant to this section shall be
17 deemed guilty of aggravated driving under the influence. A person
18 convicted of aggravated driving under the influence shall
19 participate in an assessment and evaluation pursuant to subsection G
20 of this section and shall comply with all recommendations for
21 treatment. Such person shall be sentenced as provided in paragraph
22 1, 2, 3, 4 or 5 of subsection C of this section and to:

23 1. Not less than one (1) year of supervision and periodic
24 testing at the defendant's expense; and

1 2. An ignition interlock device or devices, as provided by
2 subparagraph n of paragraph 1 of subsection A of Section 991a of
3 Title 22 of the Oklahoma Statutes, for a minimum of ninety (90)
4 days.

5 E. When a person is sentenced to imprisonment in the custody of
6 the Department of Corrections, the person shall be processed through
7 the Lexington Assessment and Reception Center or at a place
8 determined by the Director of the Department of Corrections. The
9 Department of Corrections shall classify and assign the person to
10 one or more of the following:

11 1. The Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services
12 pursuant to paragraph 1 of subsection A of Section 612 of Title 57
13 of the Oklahoma Statutes; or

14 2. A correctional facility operated by the Department of
15 Corrections with assignment to substance abuse treatment.
16 Successful completion of a Department-of-Corrections-approved
17 substance abuse treatment program shall satisfy the recommendation
18 for a ten-hour or twenty-four-hour alcohol and drug substance abuse
19 course or treatment program or both. Successful completion of an
20 approved Department of Corrections substance abuse treatment program
21 may precede or follow the required assessment.

22 F. The Department of Public Safety is hereby authorized to
23 reinstate any suspended or revoked driving privilege when the person
24

1 meets the statutory requirements which affect the existing driving
2 privilege.

3 G. Any person who is found guilty of a violation of the
4 provisions of this section shall be ordered to participate in an
5 alcohol and drug substance abuse evaluation and assessment program
6 offered by a certified assessment agency or certified assessor for
7 the purpose of evaluating and assessing the receptivity to treatment
8 and prognosis of the person and shall follow all recommendations
9 made in the assessment and evaluation for treatment. The court
10 shall order the person to reimburse the agency or assessor for the
11 evaluation and assessment. Payment shall be remitted by the
12 defendant or on behalf of the defendant by any third party;
13 provided, no state-appropriated funds are utilized. The fee for an
14 evaluation and assessment shall be the amount provided in subsection
15 C of Section 3-460 of Title 43A of the Oklahoma Statutes. The
16 evaluation and assessment shall be conducted at a certified
17 assessment agency, the office of a certified assessor or at another
18 location as ordered by the court. The agency or assessor shall,
19 within seventy-two (72) hours from the time the person is evaluated
20 and assessed, submit a written report to the court for the purpose
21 of assisting the court in its sentencing determination. The court
22 shall, as a condition of any sentence imposed, including deferred
23 and suspended sentences, require the person to participate in and
24 successfully complete all recommendations from the evaluation, such

1 as an alcohol and substance abuse treatment program pursuant to
2 Section 3-452 of Title 43A of the Oklahoma Statutes. If such report
3 indicates that the evaluation and assessment shows that the
4 defendant would benefit from a ten-hour or twenty-four-hour alcohol
5 and drug substance abuse course or a treatment program or both, the
6 court shall, as a condition of any sentence imposed, including
7 deferred and suspended sentences, require the person to follow all
8 recommendations identified by the evaluation and assessment and
9 ordered by the court. No person, agency or facility operating an
10 evaluation and assessment program certified by the Department of
11 Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services shall solicit or refer
12 any person evaluated and assessed pursuant to this section for any
13 treatment program or substance abuse service in which such person,
14 agency or facility has a vested interest; however, this provision
15 shall not be construed to prohibit the court from ordering
16 participation in or any person from voluntarily utilizing a
17 treatment program or substance abuse service offered by such person,
18 agency or facility. If a person is sentenced to imprisonment in the
19 custody of the Department of Corrections and the court has received
20 a written evaluation report pursuant to the provisions of this
21 subsection, the report shall be furnished to the Department of
22 Corrections with the judgment and sentence. Any evaluation and
23 assessment report submitted to the court pursuant to the provisions
24 of this subsection shall be handled in a manner which will keep such

1 report confidential from the general public's review. Nothing
2 contained in this subsection shall be construed to prohibit the
3 court from ordering judgment and sentence in the event the defendant
4 fails or refuses to comply with an order of the court to obtain the
5 evaluation and assessment required by this subsection. If the
6 defendant fails or refuses to comply with an order of the court to
7 obtain the evaluation and assessment, the Department of Public
8 Safety shall not reinstate driving privileges until the defendant
9 has complied in full with such order. Nothing contained in this
10 subsection shall be construed to prohibit the court from ordering
11 judgment and sentence and any other sanction authorized by law for
12 failure or refusal to comply with an order of the court.

13 H. Any person who is found guilty of a violation of the
14 provisions of this section may be required by the court to attend a
15 victims impact panel program, as defined in subsection H of Section
16 991a of Title 22 of the Oklahoma Statutes, if such a program is
17 offered in the county where the judgment is rendered, and to pay a
18 fee of not less than Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) nor more than Sixty
19 Dollars (\$60.00) as set by the governing authority of the program
20 and approved by the court to the program to offset the cost of
21 participation by the defendant, if in the opinion of the court the
22 defendant has the ability to pay such fee.

23 I. Any person who is found guilty of a felony violation of the
24 provisions of this section shall be required to submit to electronic

1 monitoring as authorized and defined by Section 991a of Title 22 of
2 the Oklahoma Statutes.

3 J. Any person who is found guilty of a violation of the
4 provisions of this section who has been sentenced by the court to
5 perform any type of community service shall not be permitted to pay
6 a fine in lieu of performing the community service.

7 K. When a person is found guilty of a violation of the
8 provisions of this section, the court shall order, in addition to
9 any other penalty, the defendant to pay a one-hundred-dollar
10 assessment to be deposited in the Drug Abuse Education and Treatment
11 Revolving Fund created in Section 2-503.2 of Title 63 of the
12 Oklahoma Statutes, upon collection.

13 L. 1. When a person is eighteen (18) years of age or older,
14 and is the driver, operator, or person in physical control of a
15 vehicle, and is convicted of violating any provision of this section
16 while transporting or having in the motor vehicle any child less
17 than eighteen (18) years of age, the fine shall be enhanced to
18 double the amount of the fine imposed for the underlying driving
19 under the influence (DUI) violation which shall be in addition to
20 any other penalties allowed by this section.

21 2. Nothing in this subsection shall prohibit the prosecution of
22 a person pursuant to Section 852.1 of Title 21 of the Oklahoma

1 M. Any plea of guilty, nolo contendere or finding of guilt for
2 a violation of this section or a violation pursuant to the
3 provisions of any law of this state or another state prohibiting the
4 offenses provided for in this section, Section 11-904 of this title,
5 or paragraph 4 of subsection A of Section 852.1 of Title 21 of the
6 Oklahoma Statutes, shall constitute a conviction of the offense for
7 the purpose of this section; provided, any deferred judgment shall
8 only be considered to constitute a conviction for a period of ten
9 (10) years following the completion of any court-imposed
10 probationary term.

11 N. If qualified by knowledge, skill, experience, training or
12 education, a witness shall be allowed to testify in the form of an
13 opinion or otherwise solely on the issue of impairment, but not on
14 the issue of specific alcohol concentration level, relating to the
15 following:

16 1. The results of any standardized field sobriety test
17 including, but not limited to, the horizontal gaze nystagmus (HGN)
18 test administered by a person who has completed training in
19 standardized field sobriety testing; or

20 2. Whether a person was under the influence of one or more
21 impairing substances and the category of such impairing substance or
22 substances. A witness who has received training and holds a current
23 certification as a drug recognition expert shall be qualified to
24

1 give the testimony in any case in which such testimony may be
2 relevant.

3 SECTION 19. REPEALER 47 O.S. 2011, Section 11-902, as
4 last amended by Section 6, Chapter 172, O.S.L. 2016 (47 O.S. Supp.
5 2016, Section 11-902), is hereby repealed.

6 SECTION 20. AMENDATORY 57 O.S. 2011, Section 510, as
7 last amended by Section 1, Chapter 115, O.S.L. 2016 (57 O.S. Supp.
8 2016, Section 510), is amended to read as follows:

9 Section 510. A. The Director of the Department of Corrections
10 shall have the following specific powers and duties relating to the
11 penal institutions:

12 1. To appoint, subject to the approval of the State Board of
13 Corrections, a warden for each penal institution, who shall qualify
14 for the position by character, knowledge, skill, ability, training,
15 and successful administrative experience in the correctional field;
16 and if the person is not the incumbent warden or superintendent of a
17 penal institution, the person shall have a bachelor's degree from an
18 accredited college or university and six (6) years of professional
19 level work experience in corrections;

20 2. To fix the duties of the wardens and superintendents and to
21 appoint and fix the duties and compensation of such other personnel
22 for each institution as may be necessary for the proper operation
23 thereof. However, correctional officers hired after November 1,
24 1995, shall be subject to the following qualifications:

- 1 a. the minimum age for service shall be twenty (20) years
2 of age. The Director shall have the authority to
3 establish the maximum age for correctional officers
4 entering service,
- 5 b. possession of a minimum of thirty (30) semester hours
6 from an accredited college or university, or
7 possession of a high school diploma acquired from an
8 accredited high school or GED equivalent testing
9 program and graduation from a training course
10 conducted by or approved by the Department and
11 certified by the Council on Law Enforcement Education
12 and Training either prior to employment or during the
13 first six (6) months of employment,
- 14 c. be of good moral character,
- 15 d. before going on duty alone, satisfactory completion of
16 an adequate training program for correctional
17 officers, as prescribed and approved by the State
18 Board of Corrections; provided, however, correctional
19 officers reinstated within three (3) years of
20 separating from the Department shall not be required
21 to repeat preservice training. The Director or
22 designee may, however, require the correctional
23 officers to attend updated training to ensure
24 compliance with agency training standards,

1 e. satisfactory completion of minimum testing or
2 professional evaluation through the Merit System of
3 Personnel Administration to determine the fitness of
4 the individual to serve in the position. All written
5 evaluations shall be submitted to the Department of
6 Corrections, and

7 f. satisfactory completion of a physical in keeping with
8 the conditions of the job description on an annual
9 basis and along the guidelines as established by the
10 Department of Corrections;

11 3. To designate as peace officers qualified personnel in any
12 Department of Corrections job classifications. The Director shall
13 designate as peace officers correctional officers who are employed
14 in positions requiring said designation. The peace officer
15 authority of employees designated as peace officers shall be limited
16 to: maintaining custody of prisoners; preventing attempted escapes;
17 pursuing, recapturing and incarcerating escapees and parole or
18 probation violators and arresting such escapees, parole or probation
19 violators, serving warrants, and performing any duties specifically
20 required for the job descriptions. Such powers and duties of peace
21 officers may be exercised for the purpose of maintaining custody,
22 security, and control of any prisoner being transported outside this
23 state as authorized by the Uniform Criminal Extradition Act. To
24 become qualified for designation as peace officers, employees shall

1 meet the training and screening requirements conducted by the
2 Department and certified by the Council on Law Enforcement Education
3 and Training within twelve (12) months of employment or, in the case
4 of employees designated as peace officers on or before July 1, 1997,
5 by July 1, 1998, and shall not be subject to Section 3311 of Title
6 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes;

7 4. To maintain such industries, factories, plants, shops,
8 farms, and other enterprises and operations, hereinafter referred to
9 as prison industries, at each institution as the State Board of
10 Corrections deems necessary or appropriate to employ the prisoners
11 or teach skills, or to sustain the institution; and as provided for
12 by policies established by the State Board of Corrections, to allow
13 compensation for the work of the prisoners, and to provide for
14 apportionment of inmate wages, the amounts thus allowed to be kept
15 in accounts by the Board for the prisoners and given to the inmates
16 upon discharge from the institution, or upon an order paid to their
17 families or dependents or used for the personal needs of the
18 prisoners. Any industry that employs prisoners shall be deemed a
19 "State Prison Industry" if the prisoners are paid from state funds
20 including the proceeds of goods sold as authorized by Section 123f
21 of Title 74 of the Oklahoma Statutes. Any industry in which wages
22 of prisoners are paid by a nongovernmental person, group, or
23 corporation, except those industries employing prisoners in work-

24

1 release centers under the authority of the Department of Corrections
2 shall be deemed a "Private Prison Industry";

3 5. To assign residences at each institution to institutional
4 personnel and their families;

5 6. To provide for the education, training, vocational
6 education, rehabilitation, and recreation of prisoners;

7 7. To regulate the operation of canteens for prisoners;

8 8. To prescribe rules for the conduct, management, and
9 operation of each institution, including rules for the demeanor of
10 prisoners, the punishment of recalcitrant prisoners, the treatment
11 of incorrigible prisoners, and the disposal of property or
12 contraband seized from inmates or offenders under the supervision of
13 the Department;

14 9. To transfer prisoners from one institution to another;

15 10. To establish procedures that ensure inmates are educated
16 and provided with the opportunity to execute advance directives for
17 health care in compliance with Section 3101.2 of Title 63 of the
18 Oklahoma Statutes. The procedures shall ensure that any inmate
19 executing an ~~advanced~~ advance directive for health care is competent
20 and executes the directive with informed consent;

21 11. To maintain courses of training and instruction for
22 employees at each institution;

23 12. To maintain a program of research and statistics;

24

1 13. To provide for the periodic audit, at least once annually,
2 of all funds and accounts of each institution and the funds of each
3 prisoner;

4 14. To provide, subject to rules established by the State Board
5 of Corrections, for the utilization of inmate labor for any agency
6 of the state, city, town, or subdivision of this state, upon the
7 duly authorized request for such labor by the agency. The inmate
8 labor shall not be used to reduce employees or replace regular
9 maintenance or operations of the agency. The inmate labor shall be
10 used solely for public or state purposes. No inmate labor shall be
11 used for private use or purpose. Insofar as it is practicable, all
12 inmate labor shall be of such a nature and designed to assist and
13 aid in the rehabilitation of inmates performing the labor;

14 15. To provide clerical services for, and keep and preserve the
15 files and records of, the Pardon and Parole Board; make
16 investigations and inquiries as to prisoners at the institutions who
17 are to be, or who might be, considered for parole or other clemency;
18 assist prisoners who are to be, or who might be, considered for
19 parole or discharge in obtaining suitable employment in the event of
20 parole or discharge; report to the Pardon and Parole Board, for
21 recommendation to the Governor, violations of terms and conditions
22 of paroles; upon request of the Governor, make investigations and
23 inquiries as to persons who are to be, or who might be, considered
24 for reprieves or leaves of absence; report to the Pardon and Parole

1 Board, for recommendation to the Governor, whether a parolee is
2 entitled to a pardon, when the terms and conditions of the parole
3 have been completed; make presentence investigations for, and make
4 reports thereof to, trial judges in criminal cases before sentences
5 are pronounced; supervise persons undergoing suspended sentences, or
6 who are on probation or parole; and develop and operate, subject to
7 the policies and guidelines of the Board, work-release centers,
8 community treatment facilities or prerelease programs at appropriate
9 sites throughout this state;

10 16. To establish an employee tuition assistance program and
11 promulgate rules in accordance with the Administrative Procedures
12 Act for the operation of the program. The rules shall include, but
13 not be limited to, program purposes, eligibility requirements, use
14 of tuition assistance, service commitment to the Department,
15 reimbursement of tuition assistance funds for failure to complete
16 course work or service commitment, amounts of tuition assistance and
17 limitations, and record keeping;

18 17. To establish an employee recruitment and referral incentive
19 program and promulgate rules in accordance with the Administrative
20 Procedures Act for the operation of the program. The rules shall
21 include, but not be limited to, program purposes, pay incentives for
22 employees, eligibility requirements, payment conditions and amounts,
23 payment methods, and record keeping;

24

1 18. To provide reintegration referral services to any person
2 discharged from the state custody who has volunteered to receive
3 reintegration referral services. The Director may assign staff to
4 refer persons discharged from state custody to services. The
5 Director shall promulgate rules for the referral process. All
6 reintegration referral services shall be subject to the availability
7 of funds;

8 19. To conduct continual planning and research and periodically
9 evaluate the effectiveness of the various correctional programs
10 instituted by the Department; manage the designing, building, and
11 maintaining of all the capital improvements of the Department;
12 establish and maintain current and efficient business, bookkeeping,
13 and accounting practices and procedures for the operations of all
14 institutions and facilities, and for the Department's fiscal
15 affairs; conduct initial orientation and continuing in-service
16 training for the Department employees; provide public information
17 services; inspect and examine the condition and management of state
18 penal and correctional institutions; investigate complaints
19 concerning the management of prisons or alleged mistreatment of
20 inmates thereof; and hear and investigate complaints as to
21 misfeasance or nonfeasance of employees of the Department;

22 20. To authorize any division of the Department to sell
23 advertising in any Department-approved publication, media production
24 or other informational material produced by the Department;

1 provided, that such advertising shall be approved by the Director or
2 designee prior to acceptance for publication. The sale of
3 advertising and negotiation of rates for the advertising shall not
4 be subject to The Oklahoma Central Purchasing Act or the
5 Administrative Procedures Act. The Department shall promulgate
6 rules establishing criteria for accepting or using advertisements as
7 authorized in this paragraph;

8 21. To issue subpoenas to assist or further investigations into
9 allegations of crimes committed in public or private prisons within
10 the State of Oklahoma. Subpoenas issued by the Director shall be
11 enforced by the District Court in Oklahoma County, Oklahoma;

12 22. To authorize award of the badge of an employee who dies
13 while employed by the Department to the spouse or next of kin of the
14 deceased employee; ~~and~~

15 23. To establish, in conjunction with the Information Services
16 Division of the Office of Management and Enterprise Services, an
17 emergency alert notification system for the public, capable of
18 distributing notifications of facility emergencies or prisoner
19 escapes for all facilities and each facility of the Department of
20 Corrections; and

21 24. To declare an emergency when, due to shortage of staff,
22 correctional officers at a facility are required to work more than
23 two double shifts in a seven-day period. As used in this paragraph,
24

1 "double shift" means two eight-hour shifts in a twenty-four-hour
2 period.

3 B. When an employee of the Department of Corrections has been
4 charged with a violation of the rules of the Department or with a
5 felony pursuant to the provisions of a state or federal statute, the
6 Director may, in the Director's discretion, suspend the charged
7 employee, in accordance with the Oklahoma Personnel Act and/or the
8 Merit System of Personnel Administration Rules, pending the hearing
9 and final determination of the charges. Notice of suspension shall
10 be given by the Director, in accordance with the provisions of the
11 Oklahoma Personnel Act. If after completion of the investigation of
12 the charges, it is determined that such charges are without merit or
13 are not sustained before the Oklahoma Merit Protection Commission or
14 in a court of law, the employee shall be reinstated and shall be
15 entitled to receive all lost pay and benefits.

16 This subsection shall in no way deprive an employee of the right
17 of appeal according to the Oklahoma Personnel Act.

2 obligations, enter into financing arrangements including, but not
3 limited to, lease-leaseback, sale-leaseback, interest rate swaps and
4 other similar transactions and to provide funds for the furtherance
5 and accomplishment of any authorized and proper public function or
6 purpose of the state or of any county or municipality or any and all
7 combinations thereof, in real or personal property, or either or
8 both, or in any estate or interest in either or both, with the
9 state, or any county or municipality or any and all combinations
10 thereof, as the beneficiary thereof by:

11 1. The express approval of the Legislature and the Governor if
12 the State of Oklahoma is the beneficiary;

13 2. The express approval of two-thirds (2/3) of the membership
14 of the governing body of the beneficiary if a county is a
15 beneficiary;

16 3. The express approval of two-thirds (2/3) of the membership
17 of the governing body of the beneficiary if a municipality is a
18 beneficiary; or

19 4. The express approval of two-thirds (2/3) of the membership
20 of the governing body of each beneficiary in the event a trust has
21 more than one beneficiary; provided, that no funds of a beneficiary
22 derived from sources other than the trust property, or the operation
23 thereof, shall be charged with or expended for the execution of the
24 trust, except by express action of the legislative authority of the

1 beneficiary prior to the charging or expending of the funds. The
2 officers or any other governmental agencies or authorities having
3 the custody, management, or control of any property, real or
4 personal or mixed, of the beneficiary of the trust, or of a proposed
5 trust, which property shall be needful for the execution of the
6 trust purposes, are authorized and empowered to lease the property
7 for those purposes, after the acceptance of the beneficial interest
8 therein by the beneficiary as hereinafter provided.

9 B. Any trust created pursuant to the provisions of this
10 section, in whole or in part, may engage in activities outside of
11 the geographic boundaries of its beneficiary, so long as the
12 activity provides a benefit to a large class of the public within
13 the beneficiary's geographic area or lessens the burdens of
14 government of the beneficiary and which does not solely provide a
15 benefit by generating administrative fees.

16 C. A municipality may convey title to real property which is
17 used for an airport to the trustees of an industrial development
18 authority trust whose beneficiary is the municipality. The
19 industrial development authority trust must already have the
20 custody, management, or control of the real property. The
21 conveyance must be approved by a majority of the governing body of
22 the municipality. A conveyance pursuant to this section may be made
23 only for the sole purpose of allowing the authority to sell the
24 property for fair market value when the property is to be used for

1 industrial development purposes. Conveyances made pursuant to this
2 subsection shall be made subject to any existing reversionary
3 interest or other restrictions burdening the property and subject to
4 any reversionary interest or other restriction considered prudent by
5 the municipality.

6 D. The trustees of a public trust having the State of Oklahoma
7 as beneficiary shall make and adopt bylaws for the due and orderly
8 administration and regulation of the affairs of the public trust.

9 All bylaws of a public trust having the State of Oklahoma as
10 beneficiary shall be submitted in writing to the Governor of the
11 State of Oklahoma. The Governor must approve the proposed bylaws
12 before they take effect.

13 E. No public trust in which the State of Oklahoma is the
14 beneficiary may be amended without a two-thirds (2/3) vote of
15 approval of the trustees of the trust; provided, that any amendment
16 is subject to the approval of the Governor of the State of Oklahoma.
17 Any amendments shall be sent to the Governor within fifteen (15)
18 days of their adoption.

19 F. No trust in which a county or municipality is the
20 beneficiary shall hereafter create an indebtedness or obligation
21 until the indebtedness or obligation has been approved by a two-
22 thirds (2/3) vote of the governing body of the beneficiary. In the
23 event a trust has more than one beneficiary, as authorized by this
24 section, the trust shall not incur an indebtedness or obligation

1 until the indebtedness or obligation has been approved by a two-
2 thirds (2/3) vote of the governing body of two-thirds (2/3) of the
3 beneficiaries of the trust. Provided, however, a municipality with
4 a governing body consisting of fewer than seven (7) members shall be
5 required to approve the creation of an indebtedness or obligation
6 under this subsection by a three-fifths (3/5) vote of the governing

8 G. All bonds described in subsection F of this section, after
9 December 1, 1976, except bonds sold to the federal government or any
10 agency thereof or to any agency of the State of Oklahoma, shall be
11 awarded to the lowest and best bidder based upon open competitive
12 public offering, advertised at least once a week for two (2)
13 successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the county
14 where the principal office of the trust is located prior to the date
15 on which bids are received and opened; provided, competitive bidding
16 may be waived on bond issues with the approval of three-fourths
17 (3/4) of the trustees, and a three-fourths (3/4) vote of the
18 governing body of the beneficiary, unless the beneficiary is a
19 county in which case a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members of the

4 bonds be sold for less than sixty-five percent (65%) of par value;
5 provided, however, in no event shall the original purchaser from the
6 issuer of any bonds issued by any public trust for any purpose
7 receive directly or indirectly any fees, compensation, or other
8 remuneration in excess of four percent (4%) of the price paid for
9 the bonds by the purchaser of the bonds from the original purchaser;
10 and further provided, that the average coupon rate thereon shall in
11 no event exceed fourteen percent (14%) per annum. No public trust
12 shall sell bonds for less than ninety-six percent (96%) of par value
13 until the public trust has received from the underwriter or
14 financial advisor or, in the absence of an underwriter or financial
15 advisor, the initial purchaser of the bonds, an estimated
16 alternative financing structure or structures showing the estimated
17 total interest and principal cost of each alternative. At least one
18 alternative financing structure shall include bonds sold to the
19 public at par. Any estimates shall be considered a public record of
20 the public trust. Bonds, notes or other evidences of indebtedness
21 issued by any public trust shall be eligible for purchase by any
22 state banking association or corporation subject to such limitations
23 as to investment quality as may be imposed by regulations, rules or
24 rulings of the State Banking Commissioner.

1 H. Public trusts created pursuant to this section shall file
2 annually, with their respective beneficiaries, copies of financial
3 documents and reports sufficient to demonstrate the fiscal activity
4 of such trust, including, but not limited to, budgets, financial
5 reports, bond indentures, and audits. Amendments to the adopted
6 budget shall be approved by the trustees of the public trust and
7 recorded as such in the official minutes of such trust.

8 I. Contracts for construction, labor, equipment, material or
9 repairs in excess of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) shall be
10 awarded by public trusts to the lowest and best competitive bidder,
11 pursuant to public invitation to bid, which shall be published in
12 the manner provided in the preceding section hereof; the
13 advertisements shall appear in the county where the work, or the
14 major part of it, is to be done, or the equipment or materials are
15 to be delivered, or the services are to be rendered; provided,
16 however, should the trustee or the trustees find that an immediate
17 emergency exists, which findings shall be entered in the journal of
18 the trust proceedings, by reason of which an immediate outlay of
19 trust funds in an amount exceeding ~~Fifty Thousand Dollars~~
20 ~~(\$50,000.00)~~ Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) is necessary
21 in order to avoid loss of life, substantial damage to property, or
22 damage to the public peace or safety, then the contracts may be made
23 and entered into without public notice or competitive bids; provided
24 that the provisions of this subsection shall not apply to contracts

1 of industrial and cultural trusts. Notwithstanding the provisions
2 of this subsection, equipment or materials may be purchased by a
3 public trust directly from any contract duly awarded by this state
4 or any state agency under The Oklahoma Central Purchasing Act, or
5 from any contract duly awarded by a governmental entity which is the
6 beneficiary of the public trust.

7 J. Any public trust created pursuant to the provisions of this
8 section shall have the power to acquire lands by use of eminent
9 domain in the same manner and according to the procedures provided
10 for in Sections 51 through 65 of Title 66 of the Oklahoma Statutes.
11 Any exercise of the power of eminent domain by a public trust
12 pursuant to the provisions of this section shall be limited to the
13 furtherance of public purpose projects involving revenue-producing
14 utility projects of which the public trust retains ownership;
15 provided, for public trusts in which the State of Oklahoma is the
16 beneficiary the exercise of the power of eminent domain may also be
17 used for public purpose projects involving air transportation.
18 Revenue-producing utility projects shall be limited to projects for

21 construction of lakes, pipelines, and water treatment plants or for

9 commissioner and the county sheriff, or their designee, and one

11 fixed rate level E, D, or D+ group home service and the charter
12 school is for the purpose of providing education services to youth
13 in the custody or supervision of the state. Not more than two
14 charter schools shall be sponsored by the Board as provided for in
15 this paragraph during the period of time beginning July 1, 2010,
16 through July 1, 2016; ~~or~~

17 8. By a federally recognized Indian tribe only when the charter
18 school is located within the former reservation or treaty area
19 boundaries of the tribe on property held in trust by the Bureau of
20 Indian Affairs of the United States Department of the Interior for
21 the benefit of the tribe; or

22 9. By the State Board of Education when the applicant has first
23 been denied a charter by the local school district in which it seeks
24 to operate. In counties with fewer than five hundred thousand

1 (500,000) population, according to the latest Federal Decennial
2 Census, the State Board of Education shall not sponsor more than
3 five charter schools per year each year for the first five (5) years
4 after the effective date of this act, with not more than one charter
5 school sponsored in a single school district per year. In order to
6 authorize a charter school under this section, the State Board of
7 Education shall find evidence of all of the following:

- 8 a. a thorough and high-quality charter school application
9 from the applicant based on the authorizing standards
10 in subsection B of Section 3-134 of this title,
- 11 b. a clear demonstration of community support for the
12 charter school, and
- 13 c. the grounds and basis of objection by the school
14 district for denying the operation of the charter are
15 not supported by the greater weight of evidence and
16 the strength of the application.

17 B. An eligible non-school-district sponsor shall give priority
18 to opening charter schools that serve at-risk student populations or
19 students from low-performing traditional public schools.

20 C. An eligible non-school-district sponsor shall give priority
21 to applicants that have demonstrated a record of operating at least
22 one school or similar program that demonstrates academic success and
23 organizational viability and serves student populations similar to
24 those the proposed charter school seeks to serve. In assessing the

1 potential for quality replication of a charter school, a sponsor
2 shall consider the following factors before approving a new site or
3 school:

4 1. Evidence of a strong and reliable record of academic success
5 based primarily on student performance data, as well as other viable
6 indicators, including financial and operational success;

7 2. A sound, detailed, and well-supported growth plan;

8 3. Evidence of the ability to transfer successful practices to
9 a potentially different context that includes reproducing critical
10 cultural, organizational and instructional characteristics;

11 4. Any management organization involved in a potential
12 replication is fully vetted, and the academic, financial and
13 operational records of the schools it operates are found to be
14 satisfactory;

15 5. Evidence the program seeking to be replicated has the
16 capacity to do so successfully without diminishing or putting at
17 risk its current operations; and

18 6. A financial structure that ensures that funds attributable
19 to each charter school within a network and required by law to be
20 utilized by a school remain with and are used to benefit that
21 school.

22 D. For purposes of the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act, "charter
23 school" means a public school established by contract with a board
24 of education of a school district, an area vocational-technical

1 school district, a higher education institution, a federally
2 recognized Indian tribe, or the State Board of Education pursuant to
3 the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act to provide learning that will
4 improve student achievement and as defined in the Elementary and
5 Secondary Education Act of 1965, 20 U.S.C. 8065.

6 E. 1. For the purposes of the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act,
7 "conversion school" means a school created by converting all or any
8 part of a traditional public school in order to access any or all
9 flexibilities afforded to a charter school.

10 2. Prior to the board of education of a school district
11 converting all or any part of a traditional public school to a
12 conversion school, the board shall prepare a conversion plan. The
13 conversion plan shall include documentation that demonstrates and
14 complies with paragraphs 1, 2, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17,
15 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 34 and 35 of subsection B of Section 3-134
16 of this title. The conversion plan and all documents shall be in
17 writing and shall be available to the public pursuant to the
18 requirements of the Oklahoma Open Records Act. All votes by the
19 board of education of a school district to approve a conversion plan
20 shall be held in an open public session. If the board of education
21 of a school district votes to approve a conversion plan, the board
22 shall notify the State Board of Education within sixty (60) days
23 after the vote. The notification shall include a copy of the

24

1 minutes for the board meeting at which the conversion plan was
2 approved.

3 3. A conversion school shall comply with all the same
4 accountability measures as are required of a charter school as
5 defined in subsection D of this section. The provisions of Sections
6 3-140 and 3-142 of this title shall not apply to a conversion
7 school. Conversion schools shall comply with the same laws and
8 State Board of Education rules relating to student enrollment which
9 apply to traditional public schools. Conversion schools shall be
10 funded by the board of education of the school district as a school
11 site within the school district and funding shall not be affected by
12 the conversion of the school.

13 4. The board of education of a school district may vote to
14 revert a conversion school back to a traditional public school at
15 any time; provided, the change shall only occur during a break
16 between school years.

17 5. Unless otherwise provided for in this subsection, a
18 conversion school shall retain the characteristics of a traditional
19 public school.

20 F. A charter school may consist of a new school site, new
21 school sites or all or any portion of an existing school site. An
22 entire school district may not become a charter school site.

11 institution whose accreditation is recognized by the
12 Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education and has
13 attained a retention grade point average of not less
14 than 2.50 on a 4.0 scale, or
- 15 b. has successfully completed a terminal degree, such as
16 a doctorate of philosophy, a doctorate in education,
17 professional doctorates, a master of fine arts degree
18 or a master of library science degree, from an
19 institution accredited by a national or regional
20 accrediting agency which is recognized by the
21 Secretary of the United States Department of
22 Education. The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher
23 Education shall be consulted to verify other terminal
24 degrees, or

1 c. holds at least a baccalaureate degree from an
2 institution whose accreditation is recognized by the
3 Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education and has
4 qualified work experience in a field that corresponds
5 to an area of certification as determined by the State
6 Board of Education, and

7 d. in addition to the requirements of subparagraphs a, b
8 and c of this paragraph, has demonstrated competency
9 or completed a major in a field that corresponds to an
10 area of specialization for an Elementary-Secondary
11 Certificate or a Secondary Certificate as determined
12 by the State Board of Education or a vocational-
13 technical certificate as recommended by the Oklahoma
14 Department of Career and Technology Education;

15 2. Declares the intention to earn standard certification by
16 means of an alternative placement program in not more than three (3)
17 years. The State Board of Education shall determine the subject
18 matter and the number of clock or semester hours required for the
19 professional education component for each person making application
20 for an alternative placement teaching certificate based on the
21 criteria of paragraph 1 of this subsection.

22 The State Board of Education shall establish a core minimum of six
23 (6) semester hours or ninety (90) clock hours and a maximum of
24

1 eighteen (18) semester hours or two hundred seventy (270) clock
2 hours for the professional education component.

3 The requirements set forth in this subsection shall exclude all
4 student teaching requirements pursuant to the provisions of
5 subsection E of this section;

6 3. Has passed the general education and subject area portions
7 of the competency examination required in Section 6-187 of this
8 title in the area of specialization for which certification is
9 sought; and

10 4. Either presents a document from an accredited public school
11 district in this state offering employment in the area of
12 specialization for which certification is sought on condition that
13 the person enroll in an alternative placement program approved by
14 the State Board of Education or declares the intention to seek
15 employment as a teacher at an accredited public school district in
16 this state. The certificate granted pursuant to this subsection
17 shall be considered a "valid certificate of qualification" for the
18 purposes of Sections 6-107 and 6-108 of this title, and the holder
19 of the certificate shall be considered a resident teacher for the
20 purposes of Section 6-195 of this title.

21 B. An alternative placement teaching certificate shall be
22 renewed for not more than a maximum of three (3) years upon
23 presentation of a document from an accredited public school district
24 in this state offering renewed employment in the same area of

1 specialization and a document from a teacher education institution
2 verifying satisfactory progress in an appropriate alternative
3 placement program.

4 C. Persons enrolled in an alternative placement program shall:

5 1. Have never been denied admittance to a teacher education
6 program approved by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education,
7 the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools and by the
8 Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation to offer teacher
9 education programs, nor have enrolled in and subsequently failed
10 courses necessary to successfully meet the minimum requirements of
11 the program, except those persons who hold a certificate;

12 2. Have on file with the director of teacher education at an
13 Oklahoma institution of higher education a plan for meeting standard
14 certification requirements within three (3) years;

15 3. Participate in the Residency Program established in Section
16 6-195 of this title and have the same duties and responsibilities as
17 other resident teachers, except those persons who hold a
18 certificate; and

19 4. Except for persons participating in the federal Troops To
20 Teachers Program, document at least two (2) years of work experience
21 which is related to the subject area of specialization if the person

1 D. The State Board of Education may grant an exception to the
2 requirements for certification and, upon demonstration by an
3 individual of specific competency in the subject area of
4 specialization, may grant a certificate to the individual. The
5 State Board may establish other requirements necessary to grant
6 exceptions.

7 E. Student teaching and a prestudent teaching field experience
8 shall not be required of alternative placement program participants
9 for standard certification.

10 F. The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules
11 authorizing adjunct teachers who shall be persons with distinguished
12 qualifications in their field. Adjunct teachers shall not be
13 required to meet standard certification. Adjunct teachers shall be
14 limited to ~~ninety (90)~~ two hundred seventy (270) clock hours of

16 G. Each teacher education institution shall provide the
17 Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation an annual report of
18 information as specified by the Commission regarding participation

20 H. The Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation shall not
21 accredit, renew the accreditation of, or otherwise approve any
22 teacher education program of any institution of higher education in
23 this state that has not implemented alternative placement programs
24 in at least four areas of specialization, including mathematics,

1 science and a foreign language. Each institution shall allow
2 individuals who meet the criteria of subsections A and C of this
3 section to be:

4 1. Admitted to an alternative placement program without further
5 qualification; and

6 2. Offered the opportunity to complete the requirements for
7 standard certification set forth in subsection A of this section
8 during the summer preceding and the summer following the first year
9 of teaching with an alternative placement teaching certificate. Any
10 person seeking standard certification through an alternative
11 placement program shall be permitted to take necessary courses
12 during regular semesters if offered.

13 I. The criteria specified in subsection H of this section can
14 be met through a cooperative arrangement entered into by two or more
15 institutions of higher education.

19 if the federal funding for positions is discontinued;
20 provided, any person appointed to a position prescribed in
21 subparagraph d or e of this paragraph shall have a right of return
22 to the classified commissioned position without any loss of rights,
23 privileges or benefits immediately upon completion of the duties in
24 the unclassified commissioned position;

1 10. Professional trainees only during the prescribed length of
2 their course of training or extension study;

15 SECTION 39. AMENDATORY 82 O.S. 2011, Section 862, as
16 last amended by Section 2, Chapter 297, O.S.L. 2016 (82 O.S. Supp.
17 2016, Section 862), is amended to read as follows:

18 Section 862. The district shall have and is hereby authorized
19 to exercise the following powers, rights and privileges:

20 1. To control, store and preserve, within the boundaries of the
21 district, the waters of Grand River and its tributaries, for any
22 useful purpose, and to use, distribute and sell the same within the
23 boundaries of the district; provided, however, that any municipal
24 corporation within the area included within the jurisdiction of the

1 Grand River Dam Authority shall be entitled to take water from the
2 Grand River and any of its tributaries in any quantities that may be
3 needed by such municipal corporation;

4 2. To develop and generate water power, electric power and
5 electric energy, from whatever source, within the boundaries of the
6 district; to acquire coal or other minerals to be used for the
7 purposes of providing energy sources for electrical generating
8 plants; to acquire or lease any and all railroad connections,
9 equipment, rolling stock, trackage and otherwise, necessary to the
10 transporting of coal and other minerals to generating plant sites
11 within the district; and to buy, sell, resell, interchange and
12 distribute electric power and energy in order to carry forward the
13 business and functions of the district now or hereafter authorized
14 by law and may enter into contracts for such purposes, such
15 contracts to run for a period of not to exceed fifty (50) years
16 except those contracts provided for in paragraphs 6 and 7 of this
17 section. All contracts may contain such reasonable provisions,
18 limitations, qualifications, protective clauses and rights and
19 obligations of purchase and sale, and such provisions for the
20 dedication of the use of facilities and the construction of
21 additional facilities to serve the load requirements of all the
22 parties as may be deemed advisable by the district to safeguard the
23 business and properties of all the parties to such contracts, all
24 within the limits of sound business judgment and practice, good

1 conscience, and not contrary to the public policy of the state. The
2 district is further authorized to participate in the Southwest Power
3 Pool Integrated Marketplace or any other program established by a
4 Federal Energy Regulatory Commission authorized Regional
5 Transmission Organization in which the district is a member and to
6 engage in the buying and selling of electricity products, fuel
7 commodities, and financial instruments as deemed necessary and
8 prudent by the district and specifically excludes any expansion of
9 retail activities of the district. The Board of Directors shall
10 adopt a hedging policy to enable the district to take advantage of
11 standard market products to reduce risk while preventing speculative
12 trading and potential abuses;

13 3. To prevent or aid in the prevention of damage to person or
14 property from the waters of the Grand River and its tributaries;

15 4. To forest and reforest and to aid in the foresting and
16 reforesting of the watershed area of the Grand River and its
17 tributaries and to prevent and to aid in the prevention of soil
18 erosion and floods within the watershed area;

19 5. To acquire by purchase, lease, gift, or in any other manner,
20 and to maintain, use and operate or to contract for the maintenance,
21 use and operation of any and all property of any kind, real,
22 personal, or mixed, or any interest therein, including trucks of any
23 size or weight and passenger vehicles and to own, construct, operate
24 and maintain any project or works in conjunction or jointly with, as

1 tenants in common, any public or private corporation duly authorized
2 and qualified to do business within this state including, but not
3 limited to, rural electric cooperatives of the State of Oklahoma or
4 the United States of America, or any department, subdivision or
5 agency of the State of Oklahoma or the United States of America, or
6 with any "public agency" as defined under the Interlocal Cooperation
7 Act, within or without the boundaries of the district, necessary,
8 incidental or convenient to the exercise of the powers, rights,
9 privileges and functions conferred upon it by the Grand River Dam
10 Authority Act;

11 6. In addition to any other powers conferred, the district
12 shall have power and authority to participate and enter into
13 agreements with any public or private corporation duly authorized
14 and qualified to do business within the State of Oklahoma including,
15 but not limited to, rural electric cooperatives, the state or the
16 United States of America or any department, subdivision or agency of
17 the state or the United States of America, or with any "public
18 agency" as defined under the Interlocal Cooperation Act, for the
19 purpose of planning, acquiring, financing, owning, operating and
20 maintaining an undivided ownership of any steam, oil, gas, coal-
21 fired, thermal, geothermal, solar, waste or refuse reclamation
22 powered electric generating plant or plants or any facilities of
23 every kind necessary, incidental or convenient for the production,
24 generation and transmission of electric power and energy including,

1 but not limited to, any and all related transmission facilities,
2 which shall be used as common facilities. The agreements shall
3 provide that the district and any participants therein shall have
4 the incidents of tenant in common to any plant or facility. It
5 shall also be provided in the agreements that the district and any
6 participant in the project shall own a percentage of any common
7 facility equal to the percentage of the money furnished or the value
8 of property supplied by it for the acquisition and construction
9 thereof and shall own and control a like percentage of the
10 electrical output thereof.

11 Each participant shall defray its own interest payments and
12 other payments required to be made or deposited in connection with
13 any financing undertaken by it to pay its percentage of the money
14 furnished or value of property supplied by it for the planning,
15 acquisition and construction of any common facility, or any
16 additions or betterments thereto. The agreement shall further
17 provide a uniform method of determining and allocating operation and
18 maintenance expenses of the common facility.

19 In carrying out the powers granted in this section, the district
20 and each participant shall be severally liable only for its own acts
21 and not jointly or severally liable for the acts, omissions or
22 obligations of others. No money or property supplied by the
23 district or any participant for the planning, financing, acquiring,
24 constructing, operating or maintaining of any common plant or

1 facility shall be credited or otherwise applied to the account of
2 any other participant therein, nor shall the undivided share of the
3 district or any participant therein be charged, directly or
4 indirectly, with any debt or obligation of any other participant or
5 be subject to any lien as a result thereof. No action in connection
6 with a common facility shall be binding upon the district except as
7 expressly authorized and provided for in the participation
8 agreement;

9 7. In addition to the powers conferred in paragraph 6 of this
10 section, the district shall have power and authority to participate
11 and enter into agreements with any public or private corporation
12 duly authorized and qualified to do business within this state
13 including, but not limited to, rural electric cooperatives, the
14 State of Oklahoma or the United States of America or any department,
15 subdivision or agency of the State of Oklahoma or the United States
16 of America, or with any "public agency" as defined under the
17 Interlocal Cooperation Act, for the purpose of planning, acquiring,
18 financing, owning, operating and maintaining undivided ownership
19 interests in any steam, oil, gas, coal-fired, thermal, geothermal,
20 solar, waste or refuse reclamation powered electric generating plant
21 or plants or any other facilities of every kind necessary,
22 incidental or convenient for the production, generation and
23 transmission of electric power and energy including, but not limited
24 to, any and all related transmission or other facilities which are

1 to be used as common facilities and to cooperate with other state
2 agencies and public trusts to promote economic development in the
3 state and to assist in attracting industry to the state. Such
4 undivided ownership interests may be created by an agreement entered
5 into with respect to property to be acquired by the district. Any
6 such agreement may be a sale agreement, with the purchase price
7 payable at one time or in installments at such time and over such
8 period as shall be agreed to by the parties thereto, a lease
9 agreement, with a nominal purchase option, or any other type of
10 agreement. In addition to the purchase price, the district shall be
11 fully indemnified as to operation, maintenance, administrative and
12 other expenses incurred with respect to such undivided interest.
13 Any payment received in respect to any such agreement shall be
14 deemed revenues of the Authority. The district is hereby authorized
15 to enter into any such agreement in order to sell, lease or
16 otherwise convey undivided ownership interests in any such property.

20 8. To acquire by condemnation any and all property of any kind,
21 real, personal, or mixed, or any interest therein, within or without
22 the boundaries of the district, necessary, incidental or convenient
23 to the exercise of the powers, rights, privileges and functions
24 conferred upon it by the Grand River Dam Authority Act, in the

1 manner provided by general law with respect to condemnation;
2 provided that nothing in the Grand River Dam Authority Act shall
3 ever be construed to authorize the district to acquire by
4 condemnation any privately, municipally or publicly owned electric
5 public utility system or any part thereof outside of the high-water
6 mark of a reservoir area or outside a properly located damsite,
7 except the districts may require the relocation of transmission
8 lines and substations so owned where such relocation is necessary
9 for the construction and maintenance of dams, reservoirs, levees,
10 spillways and floodways, and in such event just compensation shall
11 be paid. Provided that the Grand River Dam Authority shall have the
12 right to cross transmission lines of other electric utility
13 companies under proper engineering standards of construction as

20 with labor unions, provided, that contracts with labor unions shall
21 not abrogate the rights of the district to cooperate and carry out
22 Veterans on the Job Training;

23 16. To make contracts and to execute instruments necessary,
24 incidental or convenient to the exercise of the powers, rights,

1 privileges and functions conferred upon it by the Grand River Dam
2 Authority Act;

3 17. To borrow money for its corporate purposes and, without
4 limitation of the generality of the foregoing, to borrow money and
5 accept grants from the United States of America, or from any
6 corporation or agency created or designated by the United States of
7 America, and, in connection with any such loan or grant, to enter
8 into such agreements as the United States of America or such
9 corporation or agency may require; and to make and issue its
10 negotiable bonds for money borrowed, in the manner provided in the
11 Grand River Dam Authority Act. Nothing in the Grand River Dam
12 Authority Act shall authorize the issuance of any bonds, notes or
13 other evidences of indebtedness of the district, except as
14 specifically provided in the Grand River Dam Authority Act;

15 18. To prescribe and enforce rules for the use for recreational
16 and commercial purposes of the lakes created by the district by
17 impounding the waters of the lakes, and the shorelands of the
18 district bordering thereon, including the use of firearms, the
19 inspection of all boats of every character proposing to operate or
20 operating on the lakes, the issuance of permits for the operation of
21 boats, surfboards, aquaplanes, sea-skis or similar devices on the
22 lakes for hire; the charging and collection of fees for the
23 inspection or operation of such boats, surfboards, aquaplanes, sea-
24 skis or other similar devices on the lakes for hire; preventing the

1 launching or operation of any commercial or for-hire boat,
2 surfboard, aquaplane, sea-ski or similar device for hire, on the
3 waters of the lakes, without a certificate of inspection and a
4 permit for such use; prescribing the type, style, location and
5 equipment of all wharves, docks and anchorages along the shores and
6 upon the water of the lakes; the issuance of permits for wharfage,
7 dock or anchorage privileges and charging fees for such commercial
8 or private permits; and the establishment and maintenance of public
9 wharves, docks or anchorages and the charging and collection of fees
10 for the use thereof by the public; to appoint or employ such
11 persons, including CLEET-certified volunteer reserve officers, as
12 the district may deem proper and suitable for the purpose of
13 enforcing such rules and regulations as may be issued hereunder, or
14 as may be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Oklahoma Boating
15 Safety Regulation Act, and for the enforcing of the provisions of
16 the Grand River Dam Authority Act, and all violations of criminal
17 laws occurring within the boundaries of the counties where real
18 property owned or leased by the Grand River Dam Authority is
19 located, which employees shall have the power of peace officers
20 during the performance of those duties, except in the serving or
21 execution of civil process.

22 Any municipal, county or state law enforcement officer employed
23 by the Grand River Dam Authority to serve as a part-time or seasonal
24 commissioned peace officer shall be exempt from the restrictions on

1 dual office holding as provided for in paragraph 16 of subsection A
2 of Section 6 of Title 51 of the Oklahoma Statutes;

3 19. To do any and all other acts or things necessary,
4 incidental or convenient to the exercise of the powers, rights,
5 privileges or functions conferred upon it by the Grand River Dam
6 Authority Act or any other act or law. Provided the district shall
7 be liable for damage caused by the district, its agents, servants
8 and employees in creating, constructing, maintaining or operating
9 the district to any corporation, partnership, person or individual
10 whose property, either real or personal, within or without said
11 district, has been damaged and the damages may be determined by
12 appropriate action as provided by law. Nothing in the Grand River
13 Dam Authority Act shall be construed as rendering the district
14 liable for damage where it is not liable on general principles of
15 law or statute or Constitutional provision.

16 Provided, however, that in the course of exercising its powers
17 as herein enumerated, the district shall at all times consider the
18 rights and needs of the people living within and upon the land lying
19 within the watershed of the rivers or streams developed by the
20 district; provided, however, that nothing herein shall prevent the
21 district from selling for irrigation purposes within the boundaries
22 of the district any water impounded by it under authority of law,
23 provided that nothing herein contained shall authorize the state to
24 engage in agriculture except for educational and scientific purposes

1 and for the support of its penal, charitable, and educational
2 institutions;

3 20. To support and assist the efforts of state, regional and
4 local development organizations, political subdivisions, industrial
5 committees, chambers of commerce, tourism organizations,
6 agricultural organizations, environmental organizations and other
7 similar public and private agencies to obtain new and foster
8 expansion of existing service, industrial and manufacturing
9 facilities, businesses and enterprises to enhance the quality of
10 life for the citizens of the district and the state. Provided,
11 support and assistance shall be limited to an amount not to exceed a
12 total of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) per year for one
13 or more projects or efforts that are for the benefit of or impact
14 the quality of life for each city or community located within the
15 boundaries of the district; and

16 21. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General
17 Manager, department heads and other essential employees of the
18 district, as designated by the General Manager, may be permitted to
19 use a district owned vehicle to provide transportation between the
20 employee's residence and the assigned place of employment and
21 between the residence and any location other than the assigned place
22 of employment to which the employee travels in the performance of
23 the employee's official duty.

1 SECTION 40. REPEALER 82 O.S. 2011, Section 862, as last
2 amended by Section 1, Chapter 266, O.S.L. 2016 (82 O.S. Supp. 2016,
3 Section 862), is hereby repealed.

4 SECTION 41. It being immediately necessary for the preservation
5 of the public peace, health or safety, an emergency is hereby
6 declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
7 be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
