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## A BILL

To require the Secretary of Education, in consultation with the Attorney General and the Secretary of Health and Human Services, to publish an annual report on indicators of school crime and safety that includes data on school shootings, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2       *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3       **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “School Shooting Safety  
5       and Preparedness Act”.

6       **SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.**

7       In this Act:

1                             (1) TITLE 18 DEFINITIONS.—The terms “fire-  
2 arm” and “ammunition” have the meanings given  
3 such terms in section 921 of title 18, United States  
4 Code. The term “large capacity ammunition feeding  
5 device” has the meaning given such term in section  
6 921 of title 18, United States Code, as in effect on  
7 September 1, 2004.

8                             (2) MASS SHOOTING.—The term “mass shoot-  
9 ing” means a shooting during which three or more  
10 individuals, not including the shooter, were injured  
11 or killed in one location or in multiple locations in  
12 close proximity.

13                             (3) SCHOOL.—The term “school” means—

14                                 (A) an early childhood education program  
15 (as defined in section 103 of the Higher Edu-  
16 cation Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1003));

17                                 (B) an elementary school (as defined in  
18 section 8101 of the Elementary and Secondary  
19 Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 7801));

20                                 (C) a secondary school (as defined in sec-  
21 tion 8101 of the Elementary and Secondary  
22 Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 7801)); and

23                                 (D) an institution of higher education (as  
24 defined in section 102 of the Higher Education  
25 Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1002)).

1                             (4) SCHOOL SHOOTING.—The term “school  
2 shooting” means an event or occurrence—  
3                                 (A) during which one or more individuals  
4                                 were injured or killed by a firearm; and  
5                                 (B) that occurred—  
6                                     (i) in, or on the grounds of, a school,  
7                                     even if before or after school hours;  
8                                     (ii) while the victim was traveling to  
9                                     or from a regular session at school; or  
10                                     (iii) while the victim was attending or  
11                                     traveling to or from an official school spon-  
12                                     sored event.

13 **SEC. 3. ANNUAL REPORT ON INDICATORS OF SCHOOL  
14 CRIME AND SAFETY.**

15                             (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Education, in  
16 consultation with the Attorney General and the Secretary  
17 of Health and Human Services, shall publish not less fre-  
18 quently than on an annual basis a report on indicators  
19 of school crime and safety. Such report shall be produced  
20 by the National Center for Education Statistics of the De-  
21 partment of Education in consultation with the Bureau  
22 of Justice Statistics of the Department of Justice. Such  
23 report shall include, at a minimum, an updated version  
24 of the information provided in the National Center for  
25 Education Statistics report NCES 2022–144 issued in

1 May 2022, and the data described in subsections (b) and  
2 (d).

3 (b) STATISTICS ON SCHOOL SHOOTINGS.—In col-  
4 lecting data on school shootings to be compiled in the an-  
5 nual report described in subsection (a), the National Cen-  
6 ter for Education Statistics shall collect at a minimum the  
7 following data annually:

8 (1) The number of school shootings that have  
9 taken place nationwide.

10 (2) Of the school shootings described in para-  
11 graph (1), the number that were mass shootings.

12 (3) Of the school shootings described in para-  
13 graph (1), the number that were suicides.

14 (4) Of the school shootings described in para-  
15 graph (1), the number that were accidents.

16 (5) The number of people killed in each school  
17 shooting, including—

18 (A) the number of people whose cause of  
19 death was attributable to wound by firearm;  
20 and

21 (B) the number of people having some  
22 other cause of death.

23 (6) The number of people injured in each school  
24 shooting, including—

1                   (A) the number of people wounded by fire-  
2                   arm; and

3                   (B) the number of people injured in some  
4                   other manner.

5                   (7) The time of the shooting and whether it oc-  
6                   curred during school hours.

7                   (8) The demographics of each school, includ-  
8                   ing—

9                   (A) the locale code of the school, as deter-  
10                  mined by the Secretary of Education; and

11                  (B) student demographic data  
12                  disaggregated by—

13                  (i) economically disadvantaged stu-  
14                  dents as compared to students who are not  
15                  economically disadvantaged;

16                  (ii) each major racial and ethnic  
17                  group;

18                  (iii) children with disabilities as com-  
19                  pared to children without disabilities; and

20                  (iv) English proficiency status.

21                  (9) The personal characteristics of each victim  
22                  in the shooting, including, at a minimum, the vic-  
23                  tim's—

24                  (A) age;

25                  (B) gender;

- 1                         (C) race;
- 2                         (D) ethnicity; and
- 3                         (E) nationality.

4                         (10) The personal characteristics of the shooter,  
5                         including, at a minimum the shooter's—

- 6                         (A) age;
- 7                         (B) gender;
- 8                         (C) race;
- 9                         (D) ethnicity;
- 10                         (E) nationality; and
- 11                         (F) relationship to the school.

12                         (11) Whether the shooting was determined to  
13                         be an accident, and if not, the motivation of the  
14                         shooter, including any real or perceived bias based  
15                         on race, religion, ethnicity, nationality, or sex (in-  
16                         cluding sexual orientation or gender identity).

17                         (12) How the shooting was stopped, includ-  
18                         ing—

- 19                         (A) whether the shooter was injured or
- 20                         killed, and if so, by whom; and
- 21                         (B) if not, what was the other outcome of
- 22                         the incident (such as escape, arrest, or suicide).

23                         (13) The number and type of firearms and am-  
24                         munition that were used in each shooting, includ-  
25                         ing—

- 1                     (A) the make and model of the firearm;  
2                     (B) the manufacturer of the firearm;  
3                     (C) the make and model of the ammuni-  
4                     tion;  
5                     (D) the manufacturer of the ammunition;  
6                     (E) whether a large capacity ammunition  
7                     feeding device was present at the scene or used  
8                     during the shooting; and  
9                     (F) the number of rounds of ammunition  
10                    fired by the shooter over the course of the  
11                    shooting.

12                 (14) Where each of the firearms used in each  
13                 shooting was obtained and how, including—

- 14                     (A) whether the firearm was registered  
15                     where required;  
16                     (B) whether the firearm was purchased  
17                     from a licensed gun dealer or an unlicensed  
18                     sale; and  
19                     (C) the geographic location from where the  
20                     shooter obtained the firearm.

21                 (15) If the original purchaser was not the  
22                 shooter, what was, if any, the original purchaser's  
23                 relationship to the shooter.

24                 (16) If the original purchaser was not the  
25                 shooter and the firearm was obtained from the

1 shooter's home, the gun storage practices being used  
2 in the home, and whether the gun owner was  
3 charged with failing to properly secure his or her  
4 firearm.

5 (17) Whether the school had one or more teach-  
6 ers, as that term is defined in section 8553 of the  
7 Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965  
8 (20 U.S.C. 7943), who were armed, and if so,  
9 whether such armed teacher or teachers stopped the  
10 incident by shooting the shooter.

11 (18) How long did the shooting last (the ap-  
12 proximate elapsed time between the first and last  
13 shots fired).

14 (19) What was the response time of law en-  
15 forcement.

16 (c) HISTORIC STATISTICS ON SCHOOL SHOOTINGS.—  
17 The Secretary of Education shall direct the National Cen-  
18 ter for Education Statistics—

19 (1) to collect, to the extent practicable, the data  
20 required in subsection (b) for shootings that oc-  
21 curred before the date of the enactment of this Act;  
22 and

23 (2) to publish such data as revisions to the  
24 most applicable annual reports on indicators of  
25 school crime and safety issued by the National Cen-

1       ter for Education Statistics before the date of the  
2       enactment of this Act.

3           (d) SAFETY AND PREVENTION.—In collecting data  
4       on school shootings to be compiled in the annual report  
5       described in subsection (a), the National Center for Edu-  
6       cation Statistics shall collect, at a minimum, information  
7       on the existence or absence of the following measures at  
8       the time of the shooting at schools where a school shooting  
9       occurred in the previous year:

10              (1) Physical security measures, including—

11                  (A) building envelopes and interiors de-  
12       signed to protect occupants from human  
13       threats; and

14                  (B) other physical security measures de-  
15       signed to avert and restrict violence.

16              (2) Other types of security measures, including  
17       measures designed to preserve open learning envi-  
18       ronments that positively influence student behavior.

19              (3) A communication plan with local law en-  
20       forcement.

21              (4) A response plan that includes coordination  
22       with local agencies (law enforcement, fire depart-  
23       ment, hospitals, etc.).

1                   (5) An active shooter response plan (including  
2                   the use of an alert system to notify students, faculty,  
3                   and parents or guardians).

4                   (6) A trauma response plan to address trauma  
5                   resulting from the shooting, including coordination  
6                   with school-based counselors, other school mental  
7                   health professionals, and appropriate community  
8                   partners and organizations, such as community ac-  
9                   tion programs or agencies.

10                  (7) Any other similar type of safety or preven-  
11                  tion measure in place at the time of the school  
12                  shooting.

13                  (e) RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.—In collecting data on  
14                  school shootings to be compiled in the annual report de-  
15                  scribed in subsection (a), any data disaggregation required  
16                  by subsection (b) shall not be required in the case where  
17                  such disaggregation would reveal personally identifiable  
18                  information about any individual.
